HUGHES WOULD ABOLISH

In view of the fact that Mr. Hughes has said that he would do away with all the legislation of the Wilson administration, making a sweeping statement to that effect, some of the things he would do away with, and some figures in connection with them, will be of great interest to the readers of the Democrat. They were compiled by an Albany man, and are very suggestive:

Hughes would abolish—

The income tax law, which created a revenue of \$137,257,185. In its passage 178 democrats and 75 republicans voted for it, and 40 republicans against it.

He would abolish the popular election of U. S. senators. 185 democrats and 110 republicans voted for it, 1 democrat and 15 republicans against it.

He would abolish—

Publicity of campaign expenses.—114 democrats and 138 republicans voted for it, 25 democrats and 2 republicans against it.

He would abolish—

Federal trades commission, which passed without a roll call.

He would abolish—

Skip purchase bill, for which 194 democrats and 16 republicans voted and 161 republicans against it.

He would abolish—

The Clayton anti-trust law. 210 democrats and 39 republicans voted for the bill and 52 republicans against it.

He would abolish—

The revenue tariff commission, pending. 200 democrats and 39 republicans voted for it and 139 republicans against it. A bill taking the tariff out of politics.

He would abolish the—

Federal reserve bill.—245 democrats and 53 republicans voted for it and 2 democrats and 58 republicans voted against it.

He would abolish the—

Rural credits law.—186 democrats and 108 republicans voted for it and 10 republicans against it.

He would abolish—

Good roads law.—163 democrats and 128 republicans voted for it, and 13 democrats and 68 republicans against it.

He would abolish the—

Child Labor Law.—169 democrats and 168 republicans voted for it and 44 democrats and 2 republicans against it.

He would abolish the—

Safety railroad employee law, which passed both houses without division.

He would abolish—

Eight hour day law, which passed both houses without division.

Belmont, who has undertaken to raise half a million dollars to defeat President Wilson; Mrs. John Hayes Hammond, wife of the multi-millionaire mining man; Mrs. Gifford Pinchot, wealthy in her own right, whose husband
