JUDGE GALLOWAY ENDORSED BY SENATOR S. M. GARLAND

Senator Answers R. P. Hutton's
Attack on the Judge and
Speaks for His Support.

Lebanon, Oct. 23.—Mr. R. P. Hutton, Supt. Anti-Saloon League, Portland, Ore. My Dear Mr. Hutton:—I am just in receipt of a lot of circulars from you urging me to advise all people not to vote for Judge Galloway for Circuit Judge on the grounds as given by you that his decisions have not been agreeable to the Prohibitionists of this state.

You will recall, possibly, that I was present at the banquet in Albany, by special request, to hear Dr. Russell speak. I could find no fault with Dr. Russell's address—it was certainly very fine, but I did find a great deal of fault with your talk. You made an attack upon Judge Galloway for the reason that his decisions had not been agreeable to you as the superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon. You also talked in favor of Mr. Hawley, when, as a matter of fact, the candidate regularly nominated by the Prohibitionists of Oregon is Mr. Weatherford, a resident of Albany. You came into Mr. Weatherford's home town and spoke against him when he was your candidate. Why you did this I cannot imagine. It seems to me that it was poor politics, and it was certainly in very bad taste. The prohibition amendment was adopted two years ago by a vote of the conservative people of the state regardless of politics. The prohibitionists never could have possibly passed that amendment alone. The legislature practically unanimously passed the law that you people suggested without any change. state who have made the state dry. Now you, the leader of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon, in a public address, attacked the record of a circuit judge and advise the Prohibitionists not to vote for him, and you follow this up by sending circulars to the people of this state urging them to call "the matter to the attention of the church brotherhood, adult Bible classes, women's societies, etc. Use your phone, talk to your neighbors," and do any and everything in the world to defeat Judge Galloway.

I want to say to you right now that I am not going to do anything of the kind, but that I am going to vote for Judge Galloway, and I represent the position taken by you in this matter as unfair and uncalled for.

The Prohibition law is working a world of good in Oregon, and I am free to admit it, and as important as this law is to the welfare of the state, it is far more important that we have a free, untrammelled and uncorrupted judiciary. When you make an attack of this kind upon the judiciary of the state, I am not with you. It may be of some interest to you o

know that I am not alone in this view. I heard several gentlemen, immediately after the meeting in Albany, severely criticize the position that you took in regard to Judge Galloway and Mr. Weatherford. These gentlemen were republicans, and they expressed their determination to vote for Judge Galloway and for Mr. Weatherford as a rebuke to the position that you are taking. I am, indeed, Mr. Hutton, very sorry that you have done this, and I think that you are laying up trouble for the Prohibition party in this state.
