WHY FOR WILSON.

I have decided to support Mr. Wilson. His character as a man, his sympathetic understanding of the problems of the day, his record in office, his usual ability, preeminently displayed in meeting and dealing with three great emergencies of his administration, and the importance of maintaining an uninterrupted policy at this juncture in world affairs lead me to believe that the best interests of our country will be served in keeping the present administration and its party in office for the present.

I have therefore enrolled myself with the League of Independent Voters of Massachusetts.

NOTES AND BULLETS.

Here is something worth reading by people who appreciate a point with sense to it. It is from the Detroit News, an independent paper:

"A great deal of fun has been had over note-writing, although we used to be fond of quoting, 'The pen is mightier than the sword.' But President Wilson has had just two tools he could use—his pen with his brain behind it, or your life."

"That is all he had. He could send notes, or he could send human lives. He had to use either the tools of diplomacy, or he had to use American fathers and brothers and sons—of whom you likely would have been one."

"Now, aside from partisan preferences, which would you prefer a president to risk first—his pen, or your life? President Wilson tried his pen first. If the pen had failed through any weakness in its handling, he would have had to fall back on the bodies of American men, offered as sacrifices on the altar of battle."

"But the notes did not fail, because they were not weak notes, and they were not written by a weak man."

IN 1912 AND 1916.

Roosevelt said:

By misstatements throughout the

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country Mr. Roosevelt has led many people to believe charges against me. I hate to see a man (meaning Roosevelt) try to honeyfuge the people by telling them something he doesn't believe.

If Mr. Roosevelt had gone down with the "Titanic," isn't it awful to think in what a condition this country would be?

A SEATTLE VOTE.

That these straw votes in other states have the same result as in Oregon is shown by reports. Whenever among laboring men they are emphatically for Wilson. There was a striking case in Seattle. A pole of votes at the Jefferson street car barns resulted in 219 for Wilson and only 27 for Hughes.
