G. A. R. MEN FOR WILSON.

That every G. A. R. veteran owes a debt of gratitude to the administration of President Wilson is the declaration of Colonel John McElroy of Washington, lifelong Republican, and for 32 years editor of the National Tribune, official national organ of the Grand Army of the Republic. ELMORE'S RECORD.

Brownsville, Oct. 30.—Mr. Elmore did not support Mr. Ben Selling for speaker, yet his ability was recognized and he was made a member of Ways and Means committee, an honor not accorded to a representative from Linn county for thirty years before. He was also a member of the committee on banking.

Linn county was greatly interested in getting the bridge law amended, and a bill to this effect was introduced and fought through the senate by Senators Garland and Cusick, but when it reached the house it was referred to a hostile committee, and reported back to the house during Mr. Elmore's absence with the recommendation that it do not pass, and was indefinitely postponed. Mr. Elmore secured a suspension of the rules and the recall and restoration of the bill on the calendar and with the aid of his colleagues, Mr. Childs and Pierce, pushed it through the house over the opposition of five lawyers, thereby saving Linn county \$6000 on one bridge. He led the fight amending the law for appointing school supervisors. He secured in the Ways and Means committee an unfavorable report on a bill appropriating \$450,000 for irrigation and led a successful fight against it on the floor of the house, showing that every county in the state had voted down a similar measure in November, and also that the 1913 session of the legislature had appropriated \$450,000 for the Tumalo project which had proven a disappointment and failure. There were many items in the budgets submitted by superintendents of state institutions that were reduced or rejected altogether. He offers his services along with 10 others to Linn county and if elected will give the best that is in him to meet the responsibilities of the office.
