JUDGE COMMENDED BY PROMINENT OR. EDITOR

**Fred C. Baker Speaks in High
Terms of His Work in
Tillamook Co.**

In view of the attack on Judge Galloway by R. P. Hutton of Portland in sending out circular letters throughout this judicial district, the Democrat deems the following letter from the editor of the Tillamook Headlight, appropriate at this time:
Tillamook, Or., Oct. 28, 1916.
Judge W. Galloway,
Salem, Oregon.
Dear Judge:
"I am somewhat surprised that R. P. Hutton, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon, is calling into question your decision in liquor cases. One of the circulars reached me yesterday. It gives me pleasure to say that when you were Circuit Judge of Tillamook County you received the approbation of the citizens and did the community a great service in severely punishing bootleggers at a time when public sentiment was prejudiced against the local option law and it was a hard matter to convict them. I believe you are justly entitled to a great deal of credit for the firm manner in which you handled liquor cases in Tillamook county, which was much appreciated by our law and order citizens. Several prominent business men were given jail sentences and others were fined heavy fines, some the maximum of \$500.00, which made a large sum of money collected from bootleggers.
