BENTON'S TREASURER.

Billy Buchanan, Candidate for Re-election, a Faithful and Efficient Official.

"Billie" as he is familiarly known by his old acquaintances and friends, is the Democratic candidate for re-election to the office of County Treasurer, to which he has been elected by the voters of Benton county for the last 20 years.

Mr. Buchanan was born in Benton county in 1858, of pioneer stock, was raised on the old homestead south of Corvallis, and lived there up to the time of his election to the office of County Treasurer, being engaged in farming.

Some years ago Mr. Buchanan had the terrible misfortune to have his right arm amputated while engaged in the operation of a wood saw, and about 10 years ago Mrs. Buchanan also had the misfortune of losing her right arm through blood poisoning.

When "Billie" first took office the salary was but \$500 per year, and continued so until three years ago when the salary was increased by the state legislature to \$1000 a year, and for two of the last three years his duties included that of collection of taxes, which is now done by the sheriff's office, so it appears to us that these salaries which he received is not very conducive to make one very wealthy.

The books of the county treasurer have been experted, two and sometimes three times a term and never yet have been found in error.

IN BETTING ODDS ARE 10 TO 8 ON WILSON

The New York World for some time back has been telling its readers how the betting on the result of the presidential election stands the country over. Two weeks ago the odds were in favor of Hughes at 10 to 6.

The world of Oct. 27, which arrived this morning, says the most striking change of aspect in the betting occurred on the 26th, when, at Pittsburgh, the odds were even in the morning, and by evening had changed to 10 to 8 in favor of Wilson.

In New York City it was largely at even money, but some at 10 to 9 in favor of Hughes.

At San Francisco it was 10 to 9 on Hughes.

At Boston odds are even, and a \$2500 Wilson offer could secure no takers.

At Chicago wagers were heavy at 10 to 9 on Hughes.

Even money at Kansas City, with little Hughes money in evidence.

At St. Louis Democrats cannot get takers at even money.

In Philadelphia betting was even with more Wilson money offered than found takers.

In Cleveland the odds were 10 to 8 on Wilson with scarcely any Hughes money in sight.
