WHY FOR WILSON.

(President of the Erie Railroad)
No one could fairly accuse Presi-
dent Wilson of playing politics in the
railroad negotiations for an eight-
hour day. I believe his motives were
honest and that he used his best judg-
ment in doing as he did. He did not
carry the burden of the railroads or
the claims of the brotherhoods as his
load; he carried those of the people of
the United States.

Many of the Wilson laws have sta-
bilized business, particularly the Fed-
eral Reserve and the Rural Credits
Acts. We should stand for peace and
work for peace, but be fully prepared
to defend what we have.

The fight against President Wilson
has no larger aspect than an unpari-
tarian clamor of the "outs" for pos-
session of the things now in the hands
of the "ins."

TAFT ON WILSON.

This is no time to point out mis-
takes of the past. This is no time by
attacks upon the General in command
to give the idea that our commander
has not a united people behind him—
April 21, 1916.

We are fortunate in having kept
out of the present European war and
we ought to support the administra-
tion in keeping us out. If we had a
jingo in the White House this coun-
try would now be at war with Ger-
many—November 19, 1914.

He (Wilson) is not a Democratic
president. He is our president. He is
first an American, the same as we are.
We must all be Americans first. Mr.
Roosevelt characterizes those of us
who favor "the league of peace," as
men who are prattling about it. He
says we need a great standing army.
The truth is when Roosevelt gets
talking about war-like matters he
comes up as Mars does over the hori-
zon red in color, and we must stake
his statements with that in view.

"On the whole, I favor President
Wilson's policy of preparedness."—
Mr. Taft, before the Chicago Associa-
tion of Commerce, December 10,
1915.

FARMERS FOR WILSON.

Under the caption "An Appeal to

week at Medford issued an open let-
ter to farmers, which says:

"The signers of this letter, putting

plished of vital importance to the

strength, insuring a continuation of
the prosperity which has come to the
nation since President Wilson entered
the White House.

"The farmers' legislative program,
adopted in the conventions of the
Grange, the Farmers' Union, the
Farmers' National Congress and all
leading farm organizations, has been
practically enacted into law by Presi-
dent Wilson and the Democratic con-
gress. This is a record of perform-
ance.

"Above all, President Wilson has
kept us out of war.

"There is no means of judging the
future except by assessing the past.
Constructive action must be weighed
against destructive comment and re-
action. This is the true test. The re-
cord of great service to the farmer and
the nation of President Wilson is our
sure guarantee of even greater serv-
ices in the future.

"Firm in this belief, we urge you
to put all party considerations aside,
and, considering solely the interests
of agriculture—the prosperity of
which is the sure foundation of a
just prosperity for all—to vote for
the reelection of President Wilson."
