Democrat: Please allow me space in

your paper to make a few statements

in defense of Supt. W. L. Jackson and

an article published in the Albany

Herald of recent date.

I have been an agent or salesman

for Northwest School Supply Co. of

Portland for the past three years, for

Linn county, Oregon.

From the reading of the article one

would naturally suppose that Supt.

Jackson had the agency for heating

and ventilating plants. I was the sole

agent for the Smith System and sold

three in this county and Mr. Jackson

had nothing to do with the sale and

did not receive any part of the sales-

man's commission.

The article states that agents of

other houses were forbidden to canvass

in this county.

I came in contact with agents representing

other companies, and some of them were

doing some business as well as I.

When I accepted the agency for this

company, I asked Mr. Jackson if he

would give me a written recommendation

of the plant. He positively refused to do so,

for the reason that if the plant did not

measure up to guarantee, that the school

boards would censure him.

From a close analysis of the article,

it is very difficult for me to figure out

what Superintendents have been guilty of

this wholesale "graft." Of course, many who

read the article will conclude that Mr. Jackson

is the superintendent meant.

The many salesmen who gave out so

much information about this method of

grafting practiced by superintendents,

should have mentioned the names of some

of the other superintendents. As it is Mr. Jackson

must bear the whole burden. I have worked

with Mr. Jackson as teacher in Linn county

for a number of years, and I am glad of an

opportunity to recommend his re-election.
