AL JENNINGS TO BE SEEN AT ROLFE TONIGHT

This morning at St. Mary's Church Rev. Arthur Lane united in marriage Miss Bessie M. Svoboda, of Seio, and Vincent W. Ryner, of this city. The bride is well-known in her home city and has many friends in Albany where she has visited with her sister, Mrs. E. H. Horsky. The groom is employed by the Southern Pacific railroad and is well-known here.

Yesterday's temperature ranged between 49 and 39 degrees. There was .90 in. rainfall and the river rose to 3.6 feet.

Reall Vote.
The Reall vote received yesterday by Dawson, for Saturday evening, showed a continued gain for Wilson. 481,466 to 353,136 for Hughes, and 295 electoral votes to 236. The nine votes show a uniformity of majority for Wilson that is suggestive. Carried out on election day it will mean 2,000,000 plurality. The vote shows 58.16 per cent for Wilson and 41.84 per cent for Hughes of the total vote cast so far, a lead of 16.32 per cent. It is doubtful if the Reall vote altogether shows enough for Wilson.
