Items Gathered Over State Showing Proposed Expenditures of \$1,804,443

Nov. 13.—S. P. Co. has spent in Oregon during the present year on new lines and equipment \$1,913,939; on old lines and equipment \$630,887 on stations, shops and roundhouses, \$29,069.

Nyasa—Nyasa-Arcadia drainage district contract let for \$58,000.

Tillamook—Chicago capitalist buys 2,000,000,000 feet of timber in Washington and Tillamook counties for \$1,000,000.

Ontario—Thirty mile extension of Riverside Branch planned by O. W. R. and N. southwest of Ontario Junction.

Warrenton—American Shipbuilding Co. secures contract from Norwegian interests for 6 schooners at \$275,000 each.

Portland—Seid Back, Jr., a prominent Chinese of this city invents device for automatically cleaning water from glass fronts of vehicles.

Pendleton—Of the Banks in the state having deposits of more than a million dollars, the two Pendleton banks and the First National Bank of Baker are among the first four.

Oregon's prune crop is the largest

and finest in the state's history. It amounts to 40,000,000 pounds and will net the growers \$3,000,000.

Grants Pass—Contract let for new courthouse for \$75,443.

Roseburg will improve three streets with 2000 yards crushed rock.

Portland—Pacific Power & Light Co. shows net income for past year of \$3,12,127.

Wage increases at Willamette Iron & Steel Works and Hesse & Martin Iron Works were advanced 12 per cent Nov. 1.

Baker City taxes reduced twenty per cent below last year.

Hood River to get large new concrete garage.

Salem to build 120,000 home for aged women.

Silverton—Silver Falls Lumber Co. installing blowpipe system.

Sutherlin—Everfresh plant handling 100 bushels apples per hour.

O. W. R. & N. company proposes to install immediately at important highway grade crossings on its lines in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, cautionary highway signs erected 300 feet from the track on each side of all crossings.

Vale—O. W. R. & N. extension to Crane-Creek gap completed.

Oregon City—Willamette Valley Southern electric road announces it is now on paying basis.

Hood River—Fruit and berry yield this year placed at \$1,675,627.

Coquille—Logging industry active in this district.

Eugene—Company will incorporate for \$25,000 to build loganberry juice factory.

Salem—Board of Control authorizes sale of 15 tons flax fibre at 26 cts.

Florence—Government advertising for bids for construction of lifesaving station.

Portland has aeroplane factory.

Marshfield—Local grower gets \$1.632 from 12-acre bean crop.

Coos Bay—Two new shipyards are in prospect for the bay, new mills are contemplated and industrial activity is general in many lines.

A POTATO CENTER.

Halsey Has Distinction of Being One of Best Potato Shipping Points in the Valley.

Enterprise: Local and Portland potato buyers have purchased large quantities of potatoes in Halsey during the past few weeks. At the Southern Pacific station in this city and the Oregon Electric station at Tulsa over 30 cars have been shipped and according to a local potato buyer there are over ten cars yet awaiting shipment. Owing to the present car shortage, from which these spuds are stored temporarily in the Johnson & Landon warehouse here, in the O. E. depot at Tulsa, the old warehouse at Shedd and the warehouse at Fayetteville.

The crop in this vicinity was particularly good and good prices were obtained.

COMMONWEALTH SESSION.

Program for 1916 Touches Upon Roads, Legislative Machinery, City Planning, Social Welfare.

Eugene, Nov. 13.—The eighth Commonwealth conference, annually held at the State University, will fall this year early in December. The points to be considered are these:

Highway improvements; simplification of the state legislative machinery to one chamber of budgetary and general legislation; provision for expert bill drafting and regulation of the bulk of bills; a shifting of the emphasis from the legislative to the executive and administrative departments; such cooperation with the national authorities in control of natural resources of the state as will insure Oregon's getting not only her share but the fullest returns from their utilization; supervision of city planning; conservation of human life through a development of ideals of racial improvement, with the legislative accompaniment of a bill for the commitment of imbeciles.

HAD CLOSE CALL.

Two Men in Auto Struck by Shasta Limited at Harrisburg Saturday.

Harrisburg, Nov. 12.—H. L. McFadden and Mr. Stalp had a close escape from death here this morning, when Mr. McFadden's automobile was struck by the Shasta Limited at the depot crossing in this city. The depot and a large warehouse obstructs the view of the Southern Pacific tracks from the south.

The rear of the automobile was struck by the engine and the car was knocked clear of the track. Mr. McFadden was bruised on the chest and his face was badly cut by flying glass.
