**AUDIENCE SPELLBOUND**

Rev. Eli J. Forsythe, an evangelist preaching in Milwaukee, Wis., recently, took as his subject, "the modern dance." The report of his discourse says he lambasted the modern dance in so forceful a manner that women in the congregation held their fingers in their ears to avoid hearing him. He so vividly described what is his opinion of the emotions of the dancers that many men as well as women refused to stay through the sermon.
