HORNIBROOKS ON WAY HOME FROM BANGKOK, SIAM

Left There November 1st After
Numerous Farewell
Receptions.

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Hornibrook and two children, John and Virginia, are now over three weeks on their way back to the U. S., which they are due to reach about the middle of December, going immediately from San Francisco to Cherokee, Iowa, before returning to Albany. October was a very busy month for them, getting ready for the trip, with numerous farewell receptions given in their honor. One was by the crown prince, with twenty-four at the table, and music by a military band. Another was by Prince Devawongse, minister of foreign affairs the first reception ever given by a minister of foreign affairs there to a retiring diplomat. On the 24th the king himself gave Mr. Hornibrook a farewell audience and dinner, a fine affair for the former Oxford student is a royal host. The splendid treatment accorded them before they left for the U. S. speaks for their standing in the legation work of the U. S. at Bangkok and the satisfactory relationship with the Siam government.

PORTLAND STOCK MARKET.

Cattle Higher, Steers Higher, Hogs \$9.65 and Sheep Have Advanced.

Cattle—A good supply offered the trade again this morning, which found an excellent demand. All offerings sold readily and practically everything had changed hands long before noon. Prices on the best grades ruled 10 to 15c higher, while the ordinary kinds, of which there was a large supply, sold steady. Some very good cattle were included in the day's offering.

Beef Steers—The beef steer trade was active under good demand and the market was in good shape. Prices were steady to 10 cents higher on the good ones, while other offerings found good sale at steady prices. One load of prime quality beefs brought \$7.30, which was 20 cents higher than anything sold here since early spring. Good to choice steers sold at \$6.75 to \$7.00, with but a light supply; with fair ones from \$6.25 to \$6.50.

Cows and Heifers—Demand for she stuff continued heavy today and prices were steady to 10c higher. Best cows sold at \$5.75 with good ones at \$5.50. Fair kinds sold around 5c.

Stocks and Feeders—The trade in stocks and feeders was light this morning. Good steers were in good demand and sold readily at steady prices. The plain kinds found fair sale. Good steers are bringing \$5.25 to \$5.75 and fair kinds around 5 cents. Feeding cows sold at \$4.50 to \$5 for the best.

Hogs—The hog supply today was moderate and there was a very active trade. Tons sold at \$9.65 for a couple of loads with the bulk of good hogs going to packers at \$9.60. The demand was very good from all points and offerings were all sold early in the morning. Quality of the run was not very good, there being no strictly prime load in the receipts. Pigs and half fat hogs were numerous. Pigs sold from \$8.25 to \$8.65. Trading at last week's close was on the same basis as the first of week the top being \$9.60 with bulk of sales at \$9.55 to \$9.60.

Sheep—Sheep prices made further advances yesterday when with but light receipts. A few lambs brought \$9.00 an advance of 25c and yearling brought \$8. Valley lambs brought \$8.75 and yearling \$7.75. There was a very keen demand.

Prof. Beard Has Competitor.
Corvallis G. T.—Few Corvallis are aware that a competitor for the position of band-master of the O. A. C. cadet band arrived in Corvallis yesterday and that Captain Harry L. Beard will need to look to his laurels of he holds down his present job. DOPE FAVORS OREGON IN PENNSYLVANIA GAME

By Comparative Scores Oregon
Is 26 Points Stronger Than
Eastern Rival.

Dope is a great thing. According to the dope, as compiled by Roscoe Fawcett, sporting editor of the Oregonian, the University of Oregon should beat Pennsylvania by a score of 26 to 0 when the two teams meet on New Year's Day at Pasadena. It will be some game, and Oregon stands a good chance to win it, but followers do not expect such a difference in scores. Here is what Fawcett has to say:

"Pennsylvania is not the best of the Eastern eleven, by any means, but it is fairly representative of the best the Atlantic seaboard can afford.

"Although defeated by Swarthmore and by Pittsburg early in the season, it 'came back' following the return of the sensational Berny from border militia work, and has since defeated Pennsylvania State, Lafayette and Michigan, and tied Dartmouth. Dartmouth defeated Syracuse, 15 to 10, and was defeated by Princeton by the narrow squeak of 7-3, after outplaying the Rush athletes all the way.

"The Penn eleven has one more 'big' game on its regular schedule—Cornell on November 30—and this set-to ought to prove a hummer. Cornell won from Michigan by practically the same margin—23-20—that Penn defeated Yost's athletes."

A NEWSPAPER PROBLEM.

With Price of Blank Paper Soaring
The Wonder Is, What Will
Happen.

With the price of news print advanced to about 8 cents a pound, more than double the price of a year ago, newspapers generally are wondering what will happen. Editorials being given are of an interesting character. Here is one from the Coos Bay Harbor:

"Newspapers are facing a problem which will mean the reorganization of cost systems, unless they do not wish to reckon with the bankruptcy courts. The price of material is soaring so fast that paper houses refuse to quote prices through their catalogues, and in most lines of paper stock the price has advanced from 100 to 300 per cent. This paper proposes to meet the increased cost of white paper by economizing in space, we shall condense, instead of spreading out, which after all makes a better newspaper. Prices or goods sold by newspapers have not increased as fast as prices for goods sold by every other merchant in the city, but they must be advanced. January 1st means an entire change in schedules for this office which must be done to meet increased costs."

HERE'S A JAR.

Must Have Larger Tips. Why? On
Account of the War.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 23.—The ten cent tip in St. Paul was officially tabooed, by resolutions of the Hotel Bellmer of St. Paul today. At the intermission between the icewater glide and the suitcase shuffle, at the bellmen's ball, resolutions were passed urging that tips be raised to 15 cents on account of the war. During the ball, the orchestra director was under orders to ring no bells with the music, and no water pitchers were in sight. "What's the use of taking the joy out of life," E. J. Ryan, president of the club, said.

U. O. Extension Work.

Oregon is Spending More Per Capita Than Washington or California.

When anyone says that Oregon is backward in expending money for road improvement, slap him in the face with the government figures.

Oregon expended \$9.19 per capita on its roads during 1915. Our celebrated neighbor to the south, California, expended \$8.73 per capita. Washington, our enterprising daughter state, expended \$5.84 per capita.

We hear New Yorkers and Yankees telling how much the Empire state and Massachusetts are expending for roads. New York expended \$2.66 per capita, and Massachusetts \$1.95 per capita. Compare this with Oregon's princely investment of \$9.19 in behalf of every man, woman and child in the state.—Oregon voter.
