THE CAUSE OF IT

The following from an Atlanta, Ga., paper is sent to the Democrat by Mrs. S. H. Strahan, wife of a former judge of Oregon's supreme court:

It is rather amusing to the average democrat to pore over the editorial pages of the republican press of the country and note the post-election attempts at explanation of how it happened.

One attributes Mr. Hughes' failure to succeed President Wilson to one thing or combination of circumstances; another to another, etc. They all agree pretty well that mismanagement has been permitted to creep into the campaign headquarters, and most of them, now that his chances for victory cannot be further imperiled, agree that Mr. Hughes himself proved to be a decidedly weak candidate before the people.

This seems hardly fair. Hughes is a good, clean man, with a lot of ability and a likable chap, all things considered. He is a man of good address and ordinarily acquits himself creditably upon the rostrum; but he was handicapped throughout the campaign just closed by the fact that he had nothing to talk about, the discussion of which, from the republican standpoint, would strengthen his chances for success. He started in the campaign with the task upon himself to supply the convention's deficiency and furnish the issues. He tried this—tried one thing after another—but they were all little issues—trifling and with no soundness and nothing appearing in them. The only real republican doctrine he could expound in the face of the democratic record of four years was the doctrine of protection, and the people had grown weary of that years and years ago.

So, really, the only thing Hughes could rely upon to carry him to Washington was prejudice and passion. Wall Street contributions and the mere word "Republican."

It does no good to criticize the campaign management; nobody's interested in that now—anyhow, the time to have done that to any possible purpose has passed. And the wise thing for the republican betters to do now is to be good sports and show that they can lose without squealing. There's nothing to be gained from "passing the buck."

But the New York Herald of Thursday, "calling attention" to "manhandling" of the campaign management in one editorial column, in another prints the following in the course of an editorial on "The News in Wall Street" and in so doing called attention to a fact which, in our judgment, did more toward diverting the popular vote of the country from Mr. Hughes than did all of the campaign blunders or all of the candidate's personal shortcomings combined:

The movements of stocks yesterday clearly demonstrated the ardent desire of Wall street for the election of Mr. Hughes—and Wall street is merely the dial on which is recorded the feeling of the great continent-wide business community.

An opening rise in prices, due to execution of buying orders placed on Monday night when Mr. Hughes' election seemed assured, was followed with a series of ups and downs—ups when the republican nominee's chances brightened and down when they clouded—until a "Wilson scare" brought the market to a weak close.

It was an illuminating exhibition. It must have been "an illuminating exhibition!" But the verdict of the South and West Tuesday was vastly more so!

The people knew all along about that "ardent desire" of Wall street for the election of Mr. Hughes. And they knew WHY that "ardent desire." And they did not let the betting scare them even a little bit!
