WOMAN GETS \$6,966.99

Husband Killed While Logging, State Industrial Accident Commission Pays It.

Corvallis, Nov. 27.—For the accidental loss of her husband's life, Mrs. Ivan Mulkey, of this county, will receive \$6,966.99 from the state industrial commission. The payment will be made at the rate of \$30 a month until the amount is paid, provide she does not remarry. In the event that Mrs. Mulkey should marry again she would receive \$300 at that time and the balance would be cut off.

Her husband was killed at a logging camp near here last month, when a logging cable struck him on the head.

TRAIN LOAD OF APPLES.

Milton Freewater District Ships 10,700 Boxes at One Dollar a Box.

Milton, Nov. 27.—Sixteen full carloads of Eastern Umatilla county's choicest apples left here in a solid through train yesterday consigned to buyers in Chicago, Wichita and Minneapolis.

This marks the first time in its history the Milton-Freewater district has been able to send a full trainload of fruit to Eastern markets.

Every one of the 10,700 boxes was purchased outright, bringing an average of \$1 a box to the grower.

SHIP BUILDING.

Portland Getting Considerable Business in a Great Industry.

Portland's newest industry, the building of ships for the trade of the world, has been given most flattering impetus through the placing of orders yesterday with the Albina Engine Machine Works for a new fleet of four carriers of 3800 tons dead weight each. The four ships will cost approximately \$2,500,000. As with the two contracts previously held by that corporation, which are to be 3300 tons, the business was negotiated for Portland through A. O. Andersen & Co., limited.—Oregonian.
