AN APPEAL TO FRUGALITY.

N. Y. World: However serious the problem as to food supply may be, the worst possible way to meet it is by alarms and panies. Scares of every kind play into the hands of extortioners and speculators. The situation is one that should be met intelligently and courageously by individuals. In such an emergency self-help and self restraint are worth more than anything that government can do.

Food is less aboundant and therefore higher in price than usual be cause we are feeding a world at war. In belligerent nations consumption and prices are regulated by law. In this country much can be done in the same direction by economies easily within the reach of most families. To take fright at impending famine and make unneeded purchases at exhorbitant rates will not help matters.

What millions of Americans should learn from existing conditions is common frugality, which is neither injurious nor disgraceful. The price that is outrageous should not be paid. The article that is beyond reach should be passed by. The dealer who is always at the top of the market should find his customers looking elsewhere. Above all, there should be ingenuity

Government can do little in this matter except to punish those who break the law. The people can do much to take the inflation out of food prices by devoting serious attention to what is purchased, where it is pur chased, and the terms, including the cost of delivery, upon which it is purchased. There is no reason for a stampede to buy. There are many reasons for an almost universal refusal to buy except prudently.

A NEW LABOR PROBLEM.

Farm and Fireside: The agriculturat and to considerable extent the industrial, South confronts a new labor problem. Contractors and employing corporations are scouring that section gathering up negro laborers, and transporting them to the North and West to work at wages that look high ly attractive. The South needs its labor, and is coming to appreciate the black man better as he takes his flight.

A few years ago a conference of southern leaders was held with the view of securing for that section a share of the immigrants arriving in this country. It was boldly de-clared that white immigrants were wanted to displace negro workers: the anti negro agitators affected to believe there was a chance ultimately to establish white as the standard labor of the south. Of course, had it worked it would have resulted in leaving the black man out of a job, a charge on the community. The new migration northward may produce some of the same effects without such disastrous consequences. The back man is betetr off as an agricultural worker than in any other capacity. All the authorities agree that in the long run he will develop best in the coun


