ASTORIA LIKES "THE WINNING OF BARBARA WORTH"

"The winning of Barbara Worth" played in Astoria Monday night of this week, and here is what the Morning Astorian had to say the following day:

"Fresh, forceful and invigorating, as undiluted as the virile west it portrays, 'The Winning of Barbara Worth,' in stage form, came to the Astoria theatre last night and proved its right to be designated as 'the dramatic success of the season.'"

"Last night's audience were positive they had never seen a stronger play, or one better produced, or more finely acted. This conviction came with the tag of the first act and grew as the show progressed."

"Mark Swan in dramatizing 'The Winning of Barbara Worth' has made living breathing people of those characters which Harold Bell Wright in the story so vividly portrayed. They are all there, Jefferson Worth, Texas, Pat Abe Lee, Willard Holmes, and all of them, and not the least Barbara Worth. She is there with her pearl-handled revolver, the gift of her 'Uncle' Texas and Pat. She is something to look at, as a woman tourist remarked. There was such a wealth of vitality; such an abundance of young woman's strength."

"Virginia Hardy makes an excellent Barbara—though 'typical' would probably be the best word. She looks the part and gives to it the atmosphere of the desert people. The absolute absence of staginess in the characterization makes Barbara Worth and blood person—and we who have as Miss Hardy plays her, a real flesh read the book, and know Barbara as Mr. Wright drew her, were not disappointed in the stage heroine."

"Miss Hardy is given sterling support by the balance of the cast. Many people who knew the book feared that the play would fall down on this feature. They didn't believe it possible to put Mr. Wright's words into stage pictures. They were doomed to disappointment, which in this case was in the nature of a happy surprise."

NUMEROUS PROBLEMS

Railroads Will Seek Michigan Law To Boost Passenger Rates.

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 7.—Michigan's legislature, heavily Republican, convenes in January to face the task of making effective the new prohibition amendment. Among other things, the 1917 lawmakers will be asked to pass a tonnage tax law, an anti-injunction act, and a real estate brokers license law; to adopt the budget system of appropriating public moneys; and to deal with a measure put forward by Michigan railroads to increase intra-state passenger rates from two cents a mile to two and one half or three cents. Efforts of the railroads to get permission to boost passenger fares will be a renewal of the fight that went against them in the last legislature. At that time, their proposal was turned down by a bare margin of half a dozen votes.

After years of agitation, adoption of the budget system in the state's finances seems assured. Gov. Elmer S. Loomis is pledged to the reform, and it was endorsed in the platforms of both major parties.

GREAT ENTERTAINER

Harry Lauder Buys Scotch Estate With American Money.

London, Dec. 6.—Harry Lauder, who has amassed a fortune mostly by amusing the American public, and who never willingly lets any of it go, let loose of a goodly sum today when he bought the famous estate of Glen Banter and the lands of Ballimore, comprising more than 14,000 acres. Glen Banter belonged to David McBrayne, the ship owner of Glasgow.

The mansion house on Lauder's new estate stands about four miles from the pier at Strachur. Water, hills and pasture land are included within the boundaries of the estate. Harry also will be able to paddle around in about four miles of Loch Eyk which falls into his possession with the land.

OREGON HAS BIG TUBERCULOSIS PROBLEM

That Oregon has a tuberculosis problem is suggested in the survey of four counties that has just been completed by the Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

The Oregon Association, which is a unit of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, will make a survey and report upon the conditions in respect to tuberculosis in every county of Oregon.

The first figures cover the survey of Clatsop, Josephine, Lane and Jackson counties. The information is so comprehensive, accurate and searching that Dr. David N. Roberg, secretary of the State Board of Health, wrote to the Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis:

Clatsop Co.—284 cases since 1913 (without Dr. Kinney's list); 113 living cases; 74 living cases originated in Co.; 37 of these are wage earners; 33 are male heads of families; 47 need hospital care; 32 need Sanatoria care; 165 children under 16 years of age are exposed to infection; patients found in cannery, meat market, school (both pupils and teachers), dairies, restaurants, etc.; 18 had been in county less than year; 13 in state less than one year.

Lane Co.—252 cases since 1913; 126 living cases; 107 of the living cases originated in Co.; 27 are wage earners; 45 are male heads of families; there are 25 cases in homes where deaths have taken place; 49 need hospital care; 26 need sanatoria care; 101 should be cared for at home by visiting nurse; 41 were housewives; 26 school children; 1 chef; 1 hotel keeper; 5 clerks; 8 in dairies, etc.

Jackson Co.—175 cases since 1913; 20 cases are temporarily out of state; 27 are arrested cases; 32 other living cases; 17 of these 32 originated in the county; 17 need hospital care; 7 male heads of families with disease; 24 children under 16 years of age exposed to infection; 30 suspicious cases in homes with living cases; occupations—farmers, housewives, teachers, carpenter, pupils, dressmakers, dairymen.

Josephine Co.—41 cases since 1913 (no survey made of mountainous region of Co.); 17 living cases; 9 of these originated in Co.; 6 could be cared for in the home by visiting nurses; 7 need hospital care; 5 need sanatoria care; 5 are male heads of families; 10 are advanced cases; 25 suspicious cases; 15 children under 16 years of age exposed to infection; occupations—pupils, farmers, merchants, housewives, stenographer, laborers.

Rodger Blain's Success—

The Democrat yesterday mentioned Rodger Blain as attending an architectural school at Philadelphia. The school is a department of the University of Pennsylvania, whose football team, probably the best in the U. S., will play Oregon at Pasadena on New Year's Day. In competition with architects all over the U.
