AMERICAN GENIUS

Ohio Convict Claims His Invention Keeps Kaiser's Zepps and U-Boats Going

Columbus, O., Dec. 8.—Would Germany's U-boat campaign, Zeppelin raids and other aerial activities cease if it were not for an Ohio convict-inventor, Dr. Emerich W. Ritter? Dr. Ritter today claimed they would "because my process for converting natural gas into gasoline is all that saves them."

Dr. Ritter, imprisoned on a conspiracy charge, is the inventor of Germany's liquid fire. Both inventions mentioned and others he had perfected and presented to Germany from his cell in state's prison here.

"There is no gasoline and Germany's aerial and undersea activities depend on my invention. The Deutschland is fed with my product, made from the great gas fields belonging to former Ambassador Dumba in Austria."

"I have planned ten factories for making my gasoline in this country when I am released in January. My wife is being paid \$30 a week by Germany and our ancestral estates, confiscated in 1848, will be returned to us when the war ends."

Prison officials say Dr. Ritter really is a genius with chemicals.

"THE WINNING OF BARBARA WORTH" HERE TONIGHT

In the "Winning of Barbara Worth," the big scenic production which comes to the Globe Theatre tonight, there is a most realistic picture of the Great American Desert. It is a scenic achievement which has rarely been surpassed in this advanced day of wonderful accomplishments of the stage mechanics. Those who have read the book will remember, Moony and Texas Joe, stranded in this great waste of sand, baked by centuries of tropical heat. There is but a dipperful of water left between them; their discovery of Barbara's mother buried beneath an avalanche of drifting sand, holding in her death grip her babe. They begin to bury the dead mother, and as Jefferson Worth says a prayer for the soul of her who raised her little one more than her own life, the wind rises for the second time, and the sand drifting in blinding clouds and relentless fury, makes the shroud that covers the body and builds a natural mound above the spot. From the very opening of the scene; from the first cry of the babe for water until the sand-storm wipes out every vestige of the great tragedy which left Barbara an orphan in "The Hollow of God's Hand," the scene is one of which will be remembered by those who see it for a long time.

Mark Swan's dramatization of Harold Bell Wright's masterpiece was well done. Every important point is retained. There is not a single thing to be desired, and still better L. C. BIG RELIGIOUS GATHERING

Church Council Representing 18,000 Members Starts Business Sessions

St. Louis, Dec. 7.—With the organization and other preliminaries completed at the opening yesterday, the Third Quadriennial Meeting of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America today settled down to the transaction of business. The 450 delegates attending represent 30 of the leading Protestant denominations in the United States with a total membership of more than 18 millions.
