Elks Will Dance—

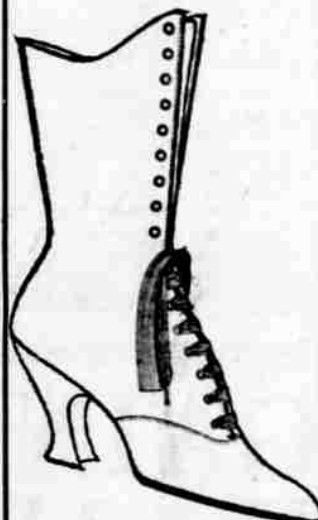
