THE BIG PAPERS

A London dispatch states that the price of the Times has been increased to three and a half pence and other important daily newspapers probably will follow suit, says the Weekly Dispatch.

Owing to the cost of production, it adds, a number of leading newspapers are being conducted at very heavy losses.

The new price of the London Times—seven cents in American money—is the highest for that famous newspaper in 55 years. Several years ago Lord Northcliffe brought the price down to a penny, or two cents, the same as the Morning Post and Daily Telegraph. From 1861 to 1914 it sold for three pence. At the end of the Napoleonic wars the price was seven pence. The Daily Mail, Lord Northcliffe's other great daily, sells for a half-penny, or one cent.

The big increase in the price of the Times is the more surprising and significant in that Lord Northcliffe was believed to have the largest and most assured supply of paper of any publisher in the world, owning great mills and forests in Newfoundland. It is quite probable that further limitations on the cargo space of British steamers imposed by the government are responsible for any acute paper shortage.
