SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

This week overshadowing other things in the world has been the peace proposal of Germany, a starter for big things sometime, whether soon or a long time ahead. There can be no peace without a beginning to negotiations. The present terms will of course not be satisfactory to both sides; but they may lead to terms that will be sufficiently so as to result in peace. It is the business of the countries concerned to see that they are, and to do so along reasonable lines, looking to future peace, and the avoidance of future trouble. When this war is over it should be settled in a manner that shall call for friendly relationships between the nations of the world, without the likelihood of dissension over every difference of opinion that arises.

In the war itself there has been very little doing the past week, neither side indicating much advantage.

The United States, because of its absolute neutrality is in a position to do a great service to the world, and it is probable will take a hand in the settlement of affairs which shall have a lasting impression upon the affairs of the world. Mr. Wilson has shown himself to be a level-headed man, capable of grasping great questions carefully and judiciously, and he will no doubt be equal to the occasion.

Back in Chicago there has been an investigation of the matter of age in employment, with the result that the men of over 45 won out, displaying as much efficiency as the younger men. Not all men as they get older are as efficient as young men; but some are, and they are entitled to good treatment. They should not be turned down because of their age. If the older man has sense enough to avoid second childhoodness he is entitled to credit for it. The proportion of young men who are not efficient is probably as great as that of older men. Men do well in younger life to look ahead to the older period and prepare for it, not just live for today. It is good horse-sense to save a little right along for the future. It is poor practice to live from hand to mouth.

The time to care for oneself is when young, a fact not realized by many young people, who get in the habit of thinking they can live any kind of a life without it affecting them; but they cannot, being human, and full of frailty, no matter how strong they may be apparently. There is a physical law at work that is irresistible.

Many of the ills of the flesh come from overeating or injudicious treating. One should be temperate in all things, and certainly in eating. A human being ought to be treated as well as a horse, and the every-day individual should at least take as much care of himself as a football player training for a big game. All about us are tragedies being enacted as the result of indiscretion.
