Prospective peace talk has reigned
some this week, without much in it.
There is little to indicate peace for
a long time. It may be years, and

tually peace in Europe. It is difficult
to figure a stopping place. The na-
tions in the struggle will all want
so much there can hardly be an agree-
ment until one side or the other is
exhausted.

A note this week sent by the presi-
dent to the belligerent powers has
caused quite a stir. It was of a char-
acter to make the world take notice.
On account of treatment received by
our commerce it was thought time to
ask for a reckoning of some kind. The
note has been misconstrued some,
and made to mean things it does not
mean. Some remarks by Sec. Lansing
it is possible are untimely. There
should be no occasion for this country
to be involved now because of naviga-
tion problems. Even if, as alleged,
intolerable, it must be remembered
that it is an era of intolerable things
just now, a time that calls for putting
up with things that would not be tol-
erated ordinarily.

This has been a week of preparation
for Christmas, the giving season of
the year. It is a fine thing for ob-
servation, even though it may be a
fact that it has developed very much
into a commercial affair. People trade
presents. One gives because another
is expected to do so. They gave last
year and will this, and it wouldn't do
not to reciprocate. It is more blessed
to give than to receive; but this
doesn't refer to the kind of giving ordi-
narily considered; but that kind done
for the good of others. It would be
a great thing if the giving could be
carried out along the lines of helpi-
fulness for those needing it. At the
same time the custom of remember-
ing close friends and relatives is a
good one when observed in a sensible
manner. More and more this is being
done.

This week has seen day and night
meet on equal terms, with the same
amount of each. We will watch with
interest the extending limits of day-
light, not because it means a smaller
electric light bill, but because, after
all, there is more comfort in daylight
than darkness. The natural is better
than the artificial, as great as the ar-
tificial is under modern invention.
