THEA BARA TONIGHT IN "ROMEO AND JULIET"

Beautiful Portrayal of Shakespeare's Immortal Love Story at Rolfe.

The sweetest love story ever told is the subject of the new William Fox master film production which stars Theda Bara, at the Rolfe tonight. Shakespeare's immortal "Romeo and Juliet," portrayed by a cast of well-known artists, with a setting more sumptuous and magnificent than anything yet done in moving pictures, furnishes Miss Bara the first opportunity she has had for portraying the young girl whose heart overflows with joy and enthusiasm.

In the role of Romeo, Harry Hillard is superbly cast. He plays admirably the young lover who cannot brook separation from his wife, even in death.

The story of the play tells how the two lovers are married secretly, because of a feud which has long existed between their families. Just after the ceremony, Romeo becomes embroiled in a duel with Tybalt (John Webb Dillon), cousin of Juliet, and is slain. The result is that the bridegroom is banished from Verona.

Juliet's father tries to force her to marry Count Paris (Einar Linden), and the girl, in desperation, takes a heavy sleeping potion, which makes her parents think her dead. Romeo also gets tidings of the supposed death of his wife, and hurries back to Verona.

There, in the tomb of the Capulet's, Romeo enters, and falls dead beside Juliet's bier. The unhappy girl, awakened from the effects of the potion, finds him there, and kills herself with his dagger.

At the Verona street scene, the Fox photo will show accurately the Verona of the fourteenth century, and Capulet's home is in accordance with some minor changes. The tomb of the fair heroine was taken from the Italian original. Of course it became necessary to restore the monument to a certain extent, but the simple dignity and massive solidity of the old vault remained.

IMMENSE LOG PILE

At Mill City Mill Has More Logs on Hand Than It Can Saw Now

The Hammond Co.'s log pond is full with several million feet of logs.

They are bringing down logs faster than the mill can cut them. To dispose of the extra logs they planted two poles, one on each side of the pond. The poles are whole trees over 100 feet high. The tops of the poles are connected by a large wire cable. A large steel carrier runs on the cable and works exactly like a hay carrier in a barn. They pick up the logs from the cars and swing them across the pond and are piling them up as regularly as we pile cord wood. Two men stand on the dump and when the carrier arrives with the log the men swing it into place. A donkey engine is the power. It is interesting to see the logs swinging in the air 40 or 50 feet above the pond. A portion of the pile is 50 feet high at present and will no doubt be built up 75 or 80 feet.
