in its vastness.

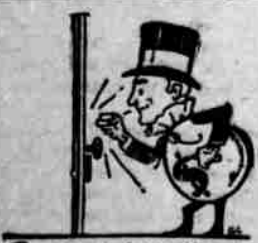
This valley has not fully felt the
