WRECKED BY CYCLONE

Schoolhouse Swept Away in Oklahoma and Many Killed

Muskogee, Okla., Jan. 4.—A rural schoolhouse situated between Blocker and Krebs, in McIntosh county, Okla., was blown away at 11 o'clock this morning by a cyclone. Between 25 and 30 children perished, according to a report reaching the postmaster at Blocker.

A private dispatch from McAlester, 13 miles away from the schoolhouse, advises that many were injured and that six bodies were counted in the ruins.

According to Joe Ting, a farmer living two miles south of Featherstone, whose home was blown away, there are 14 dead in the schoolhouse ruins.
