Johnson Will Start Legislature But Stephens Will End It as Governor

Sacramento, Jan. 3.—(By United Press)—Although Governor Hiram Johnson will supervise the introduction of principal matters to come before the state legislature starting next Monday, the business of final approval or rejection will rest with William D. Stephens, former United States congressman, who from present indications will advance from the place of lieutenant-governor to that of governor on or about March 4, when Johnson becomes United States senator.

During the first month of the session bills will be introduced. The lawmakers will have a vacation during February, and in March and April the bills will be voted on and put up to the new governor. Just how far

R.R. IMPROVEMENTS

Chicago, Jan. 4.—President E. E. Calvin announced today that the Union Pacific will spend \$14,180,000 on improvements this year. The announcement was made upon Calvin's return from New York, where he conferred with the board of directors.

Of this amount \$4,000,000 will go to complete the double track in Wyoming, making the road a double track road throughout. Eight hundred thousand dollars will be spent on a new bridge on the St. Joseph & Grand Island near St. Joseph, Mo.; \$600,000 at the Omaha shops and terminals; about \$200,000 at Grand Island for new power house, coaling station and terminal improvements and the remainder will be distributed through the various divisions for terminal and motive power improvements.

\$80,000 WANTED FOR OREGON CITY LOCKS

Are Being Put in Good Shape For Upper River Navigation.

Washington, Jan. 4.—With the money on hand from the last appropriation and with \$80,000 more which it is believed will be given in the next rivers and harbors act, the locks at Oregon City will be put in first class condition for all boats that navigate the river above Portland.

The additional \$80,000 has been a subject of some doubt, because of uncertainty as to whether it would be viewed as an expenditure on an existing project or be classed as new work. If it fell into the latter classification, difficulties might be expected in securing an appropriation.

At a recent conference with the board of army engineers, Congressman Hawley received assurances that the \$80,000 needed is viewed as properly a part of the present locks improvement, and a statement to that effect before the house committee is expected to be all that will be needed to secure inclusion of this estimate in the bill.

When the locks were purchased by the government the state contributed a like sum. About \$5,000 of the government's money was consumed in surveys and settlement of title, leaving a joint fund of \$95,000. The

FOR OREGON ROADS

Washington, Jan. 4.—One hundred and twenty-eight thousand dollars has been allotted to Oregon for federal aid to road building for the next fiscal year, a slight increase over the present year.

W. J. Drinkard, of Halsey, is in the city on business.

Locks cost \$375,000, leaving \$320,000 for rehabilitation and improvement. Work has been proceeding, and about \$90,000 was spent last fiscal year on the dividing wall between the government and private property.

At the beginning of the present fiscal year \$130,000 remained of the original appropriation, and it is estimated that this sum and \$80,000 more will complete the improvement as it ought to be. This calls for completion of the dividing wall, general repairs, lowering the sill of the lower lock five and one-half feet, putting in seven new gates at \$5,000 each, and widening and deepening the intake at the upper end of the locks.

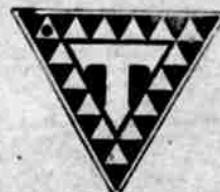

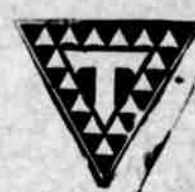
