SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

Severe weather in Europe has disturbed the murderfest in progress there, and the fighting has been of desultory character. Some days the item reads: "A calm on the Somme front." Stopping the slinging of bullets even for a short time is pleasing to peace loving people the world over.

While the bullets have lessened in frequency words have been pouring forth from numerous quarters. England, which has done less than most of the Allies in the pushing of the lines of the Central Allies back, is now dominating the peace situation. The discovery has been made that Germany is in sore straits and is asking for peace terms because of internal conditions, and, therefore, it is the business of the Allies to reject all kinds of peace propositions and fight the enemy down into the last ditch. As a matter of fact Germany is probably as well situated for continuing the war as the Allies, and so far as that goes, it is a bit and miss game.

The game, though, is undoubtedly one for Europe to settle. It is her affair, not ours. But when it comes to matters of commerce this country has rights which it must guard. It must, though, appreciate the fact that there is hot blood in Europe, and not get hot itself, overlooking many things that in normal circumstances would have to be reckoned.

In matters of commerce Great Britain has been the offender, with her blacklists, as much as Germany has with her submarines, a fact that calls for greater caution and tolerance.

The president's peace note is causing a live fight in congress, one that is developing into a mere political tilt, something that should not occur in a matter of so much concern.

When the note was sent forth it caused so much fluctuation in the stock market as to build up fortunes in a night time. This led to the charge of a leakage of the news beforehand, giving some men the inside track on operations. Well, it is a matter of stock gambling anyway, and the fellow bitten probably got what was coming to him. If there was a leakage, though, it was probably reprehensible enough to smell.

MARVELOUS SURGERY

According to Dr. William Sadler, one of the speakers at the Albany Chautauqua a few years ago, the transplanting of human organs soon will be a reality. Wealthy men before long will be able to take mortgages on the healthy organs of their less fortunate brothers and have them transplanted in place of bad ones, according to Dr. William Sadler of Chicago.

Addressing a meeting of the Wednesday Club of East St. Louis, Dr. Sadler said: "We have not yet transplanted human organs, but we have done this with animals, and it has promised to be very successful.

"I do not think it will be long before wealthy men of St. Louis and other parts of the country will be able to take mortgages on the kidneys and other members of the bodies of about 40 laborers each and arrangements made whereby if one of these men, with perfect organs, is accidentally killed their organs go to the man who holds the option on them."
