FIRST VAUDEVILLE BILL PLEASES LARGE CROWD

Manager Meyer Pleased and Will Bring Other Things to Albany.

If Manager Conrad Meyer's vaudeville offerings are as good every week as the opening number at the Globe last night, everything will be satisfactory. A large crowd packed the house clear down to the front row and liberally applauded every number and showed their appreciation for the good things. Every number was good and received the encores they deserved.

The best bit of character acting seen here in years was done by Dan Kelly, a veteran comedy actor of the old school, and his charming partner, Miss Irene Outtrim, a dainty Australian maiden. Their sketch was a bit of Irish dialogue, and was cleverly done. Kelly is a master of the Irish tongue, and why shouldn't he be, being from the Auld Sod himself. Kelly is an old actor who has been in newspaper work in California for the last ten years, and the call of the stage was too great to keep him away longer. And we're glad that it was.

Beeson and Harris are a clever pair, and kept the audience in an uproar over their comedy. They are good.

Brown and Carbonette, who were seen here last year as the Cavaliers, were good in operatic selections and popular songs. Mr. Brown has a well trained, mellow tenor voice, and pleased the audience especially with the Torredor song from "Carmen."

There is nothing to the report that the vaudeville visiting Albany is from Australia. The acts coming here are on the Hippodrome circuit, and play all the way around the loop from Chicago to Los Angeles, north to Vancouver, B. C., and east to Chicago again.

Next Wednesday an entirely different bill will be presented. Heading it is Sun Chin Loo and company of five in a celebrated mystery and illusion act. Loo was the leading court entertainer in his native land for years, and is a genius. The act is accompanied by beautiful Oriental settings. The other acts are "Singles," Myra Errington presenting a dainty song and instrumental music act; and James T. Dervlin provoking a roar of laughter with his original comedy act.

There is no reason why Albany should not get the best road shows that pass through here. But Albany cannot get them without patronizing them. This city has a black eye among all theatrical bookers, and until the city's credit as a show town is reestablished Albany will continue to be left off the map.

Manager Meyers was pleased with the house last night, however, and if the patronage continues as good there will be nothing to wish for. Then it will be up to Albany to fill the house on some big road show, and many others will then seek admittance here. In Eugene next week comes a big musical comedy, "The Purple Domino," a play which has

thereon. H. H. Hewitt, Dr. H. M. Ellis and Mrs. F. H. Geselbracht were re-appointed as members of the City Library Board, their terms of office having expired.

The matter of re-electing a city health officer was left over to the next meeting. There seemed to be some misunderstanding as to whether the council or the city health board had the power of appointing. The state statutes name the council and the city ordinance leaves it up to the city health board.

Upon motion of Councilman Wiles the council extended a vote of thanks to the P. E. & E. Co., for the fine new street car which was sent to this city, and all agreed to take a joy ride in it at the first opportunity. Mayor Carl was thanked for the manner in which he brought about the change from the old car.

Street Supt. Woods was instructed to sell the brass and other junk from the old fire engine and the old city water cart for what he could get out of them.

The standing committees and the rules of the council are the same as they were last year.

The account and current expense committee reported favorably upon the allowing of bills amounting to \$1,248.33. This includes \$443.37 for the public library and \$555 for water and lights.

Street Supt. F. N. Woods presented his annual report, showing a good sweep of the country. There are 40 girls in the chorus, a stunning list of leads and gorgeous scenery. This is one of the things that Albany misses by not patronizing good things when they do come.

record for the year. Eight blocks of street were graveled. The inventory shows a good sized stock on hand for the city. During the year the city received \$157 for the sale of manure. Other moneys received amounted to \$25.40.

Chief of Police John Catlin reported for the past quarter, as follows: Arrested 4 runaway boys, 19 drunks, 13 for carrying liquor through streets, four for fighting, one for riding horse on sidewalk, two for larceny and 160 hoboes.

The report of the Albany Public Library shows that receipts for the year were \$1,904.36, and expenditures were \$1,835.96, leaving a balance on hand of \$68.40. The full report appeared in these columns recently.

A petition, filed by H. Bryant, A. M. Hammer and signed by over 500 voters, asking that the council prepare for submission to the electors the matter of acquiring water, light and power works. No particular "works" are mentioned, but it is understood that those back of the movement are open to any proposition to either purchase the present works or to acquire new property. The matter was referred to the committee of the whole council.

A new ordinance was passed, ordering a re-survey of Denver street from the S. F. Ry. track to Second street, which portion is proposed to be opened up for travel.

The quarterly report of City Treasurer H. B. Cusick was read and approved. The report shows a balance of \$1,453.88 in the General Fund.

The balance on hand in the other funds are: street fund, \$3,339.99; paving, \$9,787.78; library, \$443.37; bond interest, \$2,190.44; interest account paving fund, \$2,916.06; plumbing fund, \$27.10; sinking fund, \$19,000; sewer bonds, \$9.83; sinking fund, \$75; 000 bonds, \$8.95; sinking fund, city hall bonds, \$9.25; sinking fund, \$8; 000 sewer bonds, \$101.08; paving Washington street, \$392.83; paving Main to Sherman St., \$163.49.
