CHANGE OF SENTIMENT

A few years ago it would have been impossible to have gotten any kind of prohibition legislation thru the state legislature; but now the legislature will pass almost anything presented, knowing that the masses are back of them, speaking for the universal change in public sentiment. Resolutions passed by the legislature are very emphatic on the subject:

"Whereas, it is proposed that the Congress of the United States submit to the various states of the Union a constitutional amendment forever prohibiting the manufacture, sale and importation within the United States and their dependents of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes; and Whereas, it is known that the traffic in intoxicating liquors results in great industrial, economic and moral loss, and greatly increases human suffering without compensatory benefits; and Whereas, the abolition of such traffic has, wherever fairly tried, brought about great improvement in the moral and economic condition of mankind; and Whereas, 23 states of the Union have by constitutional amendment or legislative enactment abolished such traffic; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Senate of Oregon, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Congress of the United States be and is hereby memorialized to submit to the states, as soon as practicable the said proposed amendment of the National Constitution."

The memorial petitioning Congress to bar liquor advertisements from the United States mails reads as follows: "Whereas, Twenty-three states of the Union have, by constitutional amendment or statutory enactment, prohibited the traffic in intoxicating liquors, and the enforcement of the laws of said states in that behalf is hampered and impeded by the circulation through the United States mails within said states of advertisements inducing and encouraging the purchase and importation of intoxicating liquors is often made for the purpose of evading laws of states prohibiting the liquor traffic, to the great detriment and injury of citizens of such states; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Senate of Oregon, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Congress of the United States be and is hereby memorialized to enact such legislation as will prohibit transmission through the mails of the United States of written or printed matter advertising intoxicating liquors for sale or other disposition."

THE LUMBER INDUSTRY Oregon Lumberman: Federal census statistics show that lumber prices, based on the figure received by the manufacturer, were ten per cent less in 1915 than in 1906, an actual loss in the ten years which have marked the greatest advance in commodity prices in the history of the nation in almost every other line. When it is remembered that the cost of supplies for the camps, to say nothing of wages, have advanced from 30 to 50 per cent in the past year, it is readily seen that the lumberman is the sole exception to the general prosperity.

The problem of the lumber industry today, however, is not that of getting more for the lumber, but of utilizing the waste. A larger market assured by scientific merchandising will solve this problem, by making it possible to avoid the heretofore waste, a waste chiefly due to the necessity under inactive market conditions, of merely cutting the cream of the forest to raise money quickly.
