HALL OF FAME

Big Movie Man Will Build One in
Central Park, New York

Americans are artistic. Leopards—that is in spots only, was the sentiment expressed by John Frederick Harbeson, the Philadelphia architect, who attended a hastily arranged conference last Sunday morning with William Fox, who proposes to endow, build and place in Central Park, New York, a Motion Picture Hall of Fame. Mr. Harbeson is making the designs for Mr. Fox and met the latter at his office.

The conference was caused by the refusal of Park Commissioner Cabot Ward of New York City, to approve the plans to place the monument to the movies in the park. Another element was the death of Prof. Hugo Munsterberg of Harvard, whom Mr. Fox intended to invite to head the Board of Trustees of the memorial. In speaking of the conference, Mr. Harbeson said:

"The refusal of Mr. Ward to approve the placing of this building in Central Park, has aroused Mr. Fox's fighting blood, and I believe he has enlisted the services of legislative experts in an attempt to force the issue. Personally and as a member of the

American Institute of Architects, which body has gone on record against the placing of public buildings in parks, the argument does not concern me. I am only the architect.

"Mr. Fox wished to confer with me about some important details of the design I am working on, notably a suitable and unique depository in the structure for the prison reform film, 'The Honor System,' which, I believe, inspired the whole idea in Mr. Fox's mind. Then again the death of Prof. Munsterberg removed from the calculations of Mr. Fox the one great personality on whom he was depending. He wished to consult me about selecting a man who might come near filling the guiding position. The death of the great psychologist was a severe blow to Mr. Fox as, I believe, a conference with him was planned in a few days.

"I am assured by Mr. Fox that this building will be erected as soon as a suitable location is selected. I discussed with him the necessity of the big citizens in every community joining together in a movement to make their city wholly beautiful, and to let this guide him in his project. Think of Rio Janero, Brazil, setting the pace for us with its memorable quay and stupendous boulevard of public institutions and think of the possibilities afforded by New York's entrance—the Battery—it is an inspiring dream. It is up to New York to prove to the world that Americans are not artistic leopards—that is in spots only."

TRAP SHOOTING

Has Grown Fast—Twenty-eight States Held Champion Shoots.

New York, Jan. 12.—(by U. P.)—Figures from various powder and gun manufacturing concerns, issued at the end of the year, show conclusively that more money is invested annually in the fast-growing sport of making dust out of clay pigeons than in any sport with the exception of golf. Trap-shooting clubs do not spend lavishly on greens or clubhouses and miss that expense. The growth of the sport is shown by the fact that forty-eight states last year held championship shoots. Conservative estimates are that 50,000 names were added to the enrollment in gun clubs throughout the country. The champions for the year by states are:

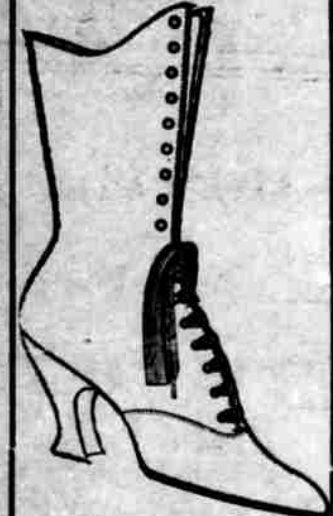
