THE TOTTERING GIANT

The stars in their courses fight against the Demon Rum. The hope that the Webb-Kenyon act might be adjusted unconstitutional was just about the last pillar the saloon interests had to lean against. And now that is gone. The federal supreme court has sustained the act.

This decision puts it in the power of any state to make itself "bone dry." Heretofore the drought might be relieved by importation in spite of local authority. Now these importations may be absolutely banned. So if Oregon prohibition leaves leaks open here and there it is not fault of the constitutional amendment but of the legislature, which can make the state as dry as it pleases without hindrance from the federal laws.

California is one of the last states where one would expect prohibition sentiment to thrive on account of its great wine and grape interests. But nevertheless the "drys" are making headway there. They have become so formidable that the California papers begin to cry that "the saloons must reform themselves or go out of business." When did the saloons ever reform themselves?

If they had shown any disposition or any capacity to do so prohibition sentiment never would have become the political force it is in this country. The saloons were given a long day of grace, fifty years or more, after prohibition was first advocated. And did they reform themselves?

Not a bit of it. They broke the law whenever they dared, surrounded themselves with an atmosphere of vice, crime and graft, lined up with the evil element in politics, allied themselves with corporation misrule and opposed such elementary reforms as woman suffrage.

Now the Day of Judgment has dawned for them and they may thank themselves. If there is a solitary booze shop legally open in the United States at the end of the next ten years we shall be surprised.—Journal.

DOWN IN MEXICO

Beginning with November 1st the Pullman tariff in force before the year 1913 will be restored, payable in Mexican specie.

The Constitutionalist Railway lines report that all the stations between Zacatecas and Torreon which were destroyed by Villistas have been rebuilt.

Work has been resumed on the railway from Saltillo toward the Gulf of Mexico, which is being constructed by the Government. Employment is thereby given to several thousand men.

Three of the richest mines in the State of Michoacan—"Tlalpujahu," "Yapatillos," and "La Libertad"—have resumed operations, giving employment to large numbers of workers.

Railway traffic between San Luis Potosi and Tampica has been restored and is now regularly conducted. The suspension was due to the changing of the locomotives from coal to oil burners.

Wireless telegraphic communication has been established between Mexico City and Merida, the capital of Yucatan, thereby greatly facilitating public as well as private business.

Orders have been issued strictly prohibiting the practice of fixing prices for goods or services of any kind in foreign money, and requiring that no other standard than the money of the country shall be followed.

The secretary of Fomento has dispatched a special commission to the State of Guerrero for the purpose of examining recent discoveries of gold in that region and arranging for suitable exploitation thereof.

The "Pastita" mine in the State of Guanajuato, said to be a rich concern, has resumed operations with a large force. New machinery has arrived from the United States and many workmen are now employed.

Some promising placer mines have recently been discovered on the boundaries of the States of Zacatecas and Jalisco, and the Department of Fomento has sent a commission to examine them with a view to their proper development.
