FULL TEXT OF THE NEW LINN CO. SALARY BILL

Senate Bill No. 91, introduced by Linn County Delegation, and read first time January 17, 1917: A Bill for an Act to amend Section 3081 of Lord's Oregon Laws, and to fix the salaries of certain officers of Linn county.

Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

Section 1. That Section 3081 of Lord's Oregon Laws be, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 3081. From and after January 1, 1917, the county officers of Linn county shall receive as compensation for their services the following salaries:

1. County judge (\$1,200.00) \$1,800.00 per annum.
2. County commissioners (\$3.00) \$4.00 per day for each day employed in the transaction of county business.
3. County treasurer, \$1,200.00 per annum.

4. County clerk (\$2,000.00) \$1,800.00 per annum.

5. Recorder of conveyances, (\$1,800.00) \$1,200.00 per annum.

6. Sheriff, \$2,000.00 per annum.

7. Assessor, (\$3,000.00), which compensation shall include and be in full for all deputy nine) \$1,600.00 per annum, and the assessor shall appoint such deputies as may be necessary, but whose number and compensation shall be determined and the salaries of such deputies shall be paid by the county court.

8. County school superintendent, \$1,200.00 per annum. (a) The county school superintendent may, at his discretion, employ a stenographer or clerk at a salary not exceeding \$300.00 per annum.

9. (b) He shall make out quarterly a statement of the necessary traveling expenses incurred by him in the discharge of his duties, which claim shall be audited and paid as other claims against the county; provided, that such sum shall not exceed \$200.00 per annum.

MUNICIPAL ACTION

Eugene Guard: The three broad principles upon which the San Francisco chamber of commerce is now working, under the guidance of its secretary-manager, Robert Newton Lynch, a former Baptist minister, were explained by Dr. Langford, who is a personal friend of Mr. Lynch, in an address at Eugene.

"San Francisco was fortunate when she discovered Lynch," said Dr. Langford. "Under his guidance the chamber of commerce adopted broad principles of action that are giving that city a vast impetus in the world of trade and city advancement."

"In the first place, the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce has adopted the policy never to speak as with authority until it is in possession of all the facts. In order to make good that principle, the chamber brought from New York expert statisticians to make a survey of the city as to its labor conditions, transportation facilities, housing problems, and all the other factors that go to make up the life of a community."

"A second platform is never to evade an issue that comes before the city on a moral basis."

"The third platform is never to take hold of a project unless they are prepared to see it through."

DOUBLE LAUNCHING AT OAKLAND, CALIF., TO-DAY

Two Steel Vessels Slid Into Water Sold Two and Three Times.

Oakland, Calif., Jan. 20.—The first double launching in the history of steel shipbuilding took place this morning at the yards of the Union Iron Works, a Charles Schwab concern, on the Oakland inner harbor. Simultaneously, the Regulus, 6,000 tons, and the Bessa, 10,000 tons, slid down the ways while thousands cheered, whistles tooted, bands played, and a half dozen motion picture camera men filmed the event.

As soon as the ships were in the water—so great is the demand for vessels—workmen began setting the keel blocks for two other big steel steamships.

Indicative also of the demand for ships in these war times is the record of the reselling of these two vessels. The Regulus is now the property of C. Henry Smith after having been sold twice. It was ordered by the Hon. A. O. Lindvig, former prime minister of Norway. The Bessa now is in the name of Wilhelm Wilhelm, also a Norwegian, after having changed hands three times since it was ordered. In each instance a large profit was made until now it is said the vessels have sold for almost double their contract price.

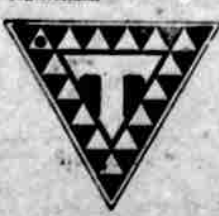
