PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

Cattle—The offering of cattle was very good Monday, and the market was in fairly good shape on everything offered. The demand from the large packers was limited, although there was a liberal outlet to various butchers and a good one for feeding stuff which made a rather active trade. Prices on all good grades were fully steady, while other grades showed ten cents lower, in a number of cases the market being practically steady with last week's prices. Large packers are fairly well supplied with present means, although a continued good trade can be looked for.

Beef Steers—The beef steer trade was active, and the market was in good shape. The feature of the trade was the sale of several loads of prime grain and hay fed at \$8.50; most of the fairly good beef steers crossed the scales from \$8 to \$8.25; and fair kinds at \$7.25 to \$7.75; ordinary valley steers brought from \$6.50 to \$7; while the common kind sold from \$5 to \$6 with a limited outlet.

Cows and Heifers—Cows of good quality found very good demand at prices fully steady with a week ago. One lot brought an advance of 20c, bringing \$7.60; with a number of bunches at \$7.50; the fair to good kind brought \$6.75 to \$7; while medium valley sold \$6 to \$6.50. There was a very liberal spread of common cow stuff from valley and coast points dumped on the market Monday which set the market back considerably. Prices on these grades were in some cases on a steady basis, although the bulk of the stuff was moved ten to 15 cents lower.

Bulls and Stags—Best heavy bulls brought \$5.50; good ones \$5 to \$5.25; young service bulls \$6; best stags brought \$7 to \$7.50.

Stockers and Feeders—The stocker and feeder trade was active and prices about steady. There was a good demand for everything and the market is in excellent shape, one load of prime steers bringing \$7.75, with several loads of good steers at \$7 to \$7.25, mixed stuff brought \$6 to \$6.50; stock cows sold from \$4.50 to \$5.60.

Hogs—There was a light supply of hogs here Monday, which met a very good demand and buyers had to share the offerings at sellers' prices. Hogs are rapidly nearing a record price paid in 1909 when the market touched \$11.50. Prices were advanced 25 to 30 cents again, sellers getting everything they asked for, most of the good hogs crossing the scales at \$10.85, there being no strictly top hogs offered. Pigs were in light supply and met a good demand, the bulk getting \$9.35 and a few scattered sales at \$10.00.

Sheep—Lambs continued their up-

ward climb today. There were four decks of prime Idaho lambs, the first seen on the open market for many months which crossed the scales at an even \$12, best valley lambs climbed up to \$11.50; the market on old sheep is practically the same, although there were no offerings to test values. Best yearlings are quoted at \$10 with medium at \$9.55; best mutton ewes at \$8 to \$8.50; heavy mutton types from \$7 to \$7.50.

Assignment for Creditors—

R. L. Sabin, secretary of the Merchants' Protective Association of Portland, has given notice to creditors that I. E. Conn, the Main street merchant, has become insolvent and has transferred his assets to him for the benefit pro rata of his creditors. He names the liabilities at approximately \$11,000, the stock of merchandise \$4,000, cost of fixtures \$1,500, book accounts \$3,500, and insurance \$800 to \$1,200.

The majesty of the scene crowded out all common thoughts and my brain seemed filled with music which unknown to myself, had long been waiting there.

With the thought that others may fall under the same spell, as their delight in the sea will create a or viny for-vision long forgotten, I have brought together these sketches from the world's great brushes. May the pictures on these pages, blended with the pictures spread before you, give a deeper enjoyment of the earth's great mystery—the ever-restless sea. The first poem is a song by Mrs. Henderson, I Love the Sea, a pretty thing. Then follow selections from Longfellow, Byron, Poe, Diamond,

Gould, Taylor, Van Dyke, Wadsworth, Mrs. Higginson, Samuel Simpson, Ina Colbrith, G. Sterling, Robert Joseph Diven, of this city; Tennyson, closing with a verse from the Bible: "And I saw as it were a sea of glass mingled with fire; and them that had gotten the victory stand on the sea of glass having the harps of God.—Rev. 15.

The title picture is a lighthouse scene, then some big breakers, seals on the rocks, by Crawford; more breakers, Jumpoff Joe and a sunset scene.
