STATE GAME WARDEN LINN COUNTY SITUATION

Declares That the County Has
Been Looked After
Liberal.

In response to the action of the Albany Commercial club asking for the abolition of the fish and game commission, the state game warden has sent the following to Senator Cusick, which will give his side of the case in a very complete manner: Honorable E. D. Cusick, Senator, Linn County, Salem, Oregon. My dear Senator:

I have seen a copy of a circular sent out by the Albany Commercial Club, which is entitled "Abolish the Game Commission." In order that you may be fully advised regarding the various matters mentioned, and charges preferred, I take this opportunity of giving you the figures which speak for themselves.

During the year 1915 the Fish and Game Commission received from Linn county the sum of \$3,354.00 from the sale of hunting and angling licenses. During 1916, \$2,577.30 was received, making a total of \$5,931.30. In the circular it is stated that less than \$300.00 in actual money was paid for game warden service in your county for the same period. Practically all of this time we have had two wardens on the payroll who have drawn a total of \$2,937.08 in salary and expenses. S. B. Tyler of Brownsville has been on steadily for the past two years and his salary aggregated \$1,800.00 and his expenses \$128.45 for the two years. J. R. Metzger of Albany has been on practically the entire time and has received \$740.83 in salary and \$257.80 in expenses. Neither one of these men is owed any sum by the Fish and Game Commission at this time. All salaries and expenses for the period covered have been paid.

The Fish and Game Commission liberated during the season of 1915, 100,530 game trout in the various streams of Linn county. During the year 1916, 255,950 game trout were liberated.

During the same period the Fish and Game Commission paid, in additional bounties on wolves and cougar, the sum of \$310.00.

During the two years ago, approximately 400 Chinese pheasants have been liberated within Linn county. The number of pheasants liberated is, as I stated, approximate; but all other figures given in this letter are accurate. I do not have the absolute figures on Chinese pheasants with me.

The Fish and Game Commission maintains an office in the Commercial Club Building in Portland. This office is located on the ground floor and has a great deal of window space which has been used to excellent advantage in the display of animals and birds of Oregon. We have three rooms for which we pay the sum of \$120 per month; very inexpensive quarters when compared with the exceptional advantages which they afford in conveniently handling a large volume of business from day to day. The business of the Game Department is constantly increasing as the game protection sentiment increases.

State Biologist William Finley

spent from the Game Protection Fund during the year 1916, the sum of \$3,091.14, which included the purchase of films, other photographic supplies, traveling expenses, traveling expenses of an assistant, and various other sundry items of minor expenses. If Mr. Finley ever employed 40 cowboys to help him get a picture of a bobcat, they either worked for nothing, or Mr. Finley paid them out of his own pocket, as no expense voucher for the employment of any cowboys in the taking of any of his pictures has ever been paid by the Commission.

I also note with regret, the wholesale slaughter of Chinese pheasants, and the running of deer with dogs, in Linn county, during these two years. I believe that you appreciate, Senator, that a game warden and the Game Department must depend to a large extent for their success upon the cooperation of the good sportsmen and the good citizens of every community, and if these violations have been going on in an open and flagrant manner, which is charged in this circular, I am sure that some good citizen or some good sportsman would have long before voiced a protest, and that the Rod and Gun Clubs and other game protective organizations of Linn county would have been clamoring for relief. I can say to you honestly, and sincerely, that no report of a game violation in Linn county has ever come to the attention of the Game Department, either at its head office in Portland, or to its wardens in Linn county, but has been thoroughly investigated and disposed of according to law. Quite frequently reports reach the office which, upon investigation, prove unfounded. If the person responsible for this circular has information at hand regarding violations, I believe that as a good sportsman, he should turn over this information to the Game Department which, I assure you, will make every effort to apprehend and prosecute those who have violated the law.

Some time ago I attended a meeting in the rooms of the Commercial Club at Albany, at which time I discussed various situations, and was assured that with the exception of the need of an adequate fish ladder at Oregon City, the sportsmen about Albany were entirely satisfied with conditions and that they would cooperate with the Game Department, not only in holding down game violations but in actively building up game protection sentiment.

The Game Warden has a hard task at the best, and it is absolutely vital to the conservation of our fish and game that those who are good sportsmen, as well as good citizens, report violations when they hear of them. If they do not so report, and so cooperate with the game department, it is ill-advised on their part to come out later and say that violations are going on and no effort is being made to enforce the game laws.

We have been striving earnestly to build up sentiment favorable to game protection and game conservation. We realize that only through the cooperation of the people can we accomplish this purpose. If the people of Oregon expect to continue to enjoy in the future the splendid sport of hunting and angling, they must not only be friendly to game protection, but they must actively cooperate and assist the Game Department in enforcing the laws. The man who knows of game violations and does not report them, and then later charges the Game Department with inefficiency, is no better than the violator

ALSEA WOMAN WHO IS 92 YEARS OF AGE

The 92d birthday of Grandma Clarke, of Alsea, was recently celebrated. She has the distinction of having been a pioneer on seven different frontiers, at least that is the way a long poem on her birthday makes it: Virginia, where she was born; the Wabash, with its hickory groves; then Ohio, where she gave to Bennett, Tom, her love, her heart, her hand; next old Missouri state, and thence to Arkansas, where typhoid laid her husband low; then she came to the land where rolls the Oregon, through Nevada's barren wastes and o'er the Sierras high, and they did not stop until they reached the place known as Eola hills, which was in 1856, and a few years hence to Jerry Clarke she gave her hand in marriage. In '62 they went to Alsea Valley, and since then the history of that place is radiant with her name.
