Dr. Danford Did Good Work For the Church, a Strong Evangelist.

### GOVERNMENT HUNTER KILLED BY WOLVES

Gnawed Bones and Scattered Clothing With Dead Wolves Indicate Struggle.

Gold Hill, Ore., Jan. 29.—(By United Press)—It is believed a pack of timber wolves killed and devoured John Hammersley, a Government hunter, near Willows Flats, Jackson county, last week. Hammersley disappeared, and searchers found the man's scattered, gnawed bones, shreds of clothing and the corpses of three wolves. The indications are that a desperate struggle occurred. It is believed the victim fought the wolves until his ammunition was exhausted.

Salem—Saving of \$3,000 to \$6,000 to be made on house clerk hire this year.

Beaverton—Brickyard, idle two years, to re-open under new management and employ 40.  
Eugene—Hauser Bros. will build powder magazine.  
Cottage Grove—Utah-Idaho Sugar Co. offers \$6.30 a ton f. o. b. for sugar beets. Local farmers will no doubt take advantage of the opportunity.  
Eugene—Flax company forms to promote flax industry. Will erect modern plant.  
Winchester Bay—Hotel and dancing pavilion destroyed by fire to be rebuilt.  
The Dalles—New modern concrete garage building planned.  
North Bend—Local box factory will operate and also install shingle machines.  
Pendleton—Standard Oil Co. asks 20-year franchise for plant in west end.  
Reith has terminal improvements costing \$500,000, monthly payroll of \$10,000 and appropriations for coming year of \$160,000. Expects to become largest terminal on line.  
Fairview—Libby, McNeil & Libby negotiating to establish cannery.
