Weather Report—

Yesterday's temperature ranged between 25 and 38 degrees. The rain fall was .11 inches and the river rose to 7.5 feet.

An excellent program has been prepared which will furnish considerable amusement and entertainment. Following this the boxes will be auctioned off to the highest bidders. The ladies will bring a tempting array of boxes containing dainty lunches that are calculated to call for big bids from the men. A large crowd of Knights and their ladies is expected.

Autos Collide—

A collision between Ben Rozelle's auto truck and Dr. J. H. Robnett's Studebaker took place this morning to the detriment of the latter vehicle. In proceeding down the street Dr. Robnett came toward the auto truck and when he tried to put on the brake the brake rod broke and permitted the machine to skid on the icy pavement. Shipped Car of Hides—

The Albany Tanning Co. yesterday shipped another car of hides direct to the Boston market. The tannery has been working to full capacity and at the present time is unable to fill orders for leather. The capacity of the plant, however, is not large enough to tan all the hides purchased by the buyers for the firm and the surplus hides are sold to other tanners. Arrangements are being made

to enlarge the plant and in the future all these hides will be tanned at home. The shipment contained about 700 hides weighing about 30,000 pounds and valued at over \$7,000.

Anderson Has Fine Horses—

Pete Anderson, proprietor of the Wigwam Livery Stable has a fine collection of horseflesh in his barn today. There are 16 head of them, all fine specimens. Fourteen of the animals will be shipped to Portland and from there to Alaska. These 14 weigh from 1700 to 2000 pounds each and are valued at an average of \$250 each. They are all draft horses of the various breeds, Percheron, Belgians, Clydesdales, etc. They were purchased in the vicinity of Albany. Mr. Anderson also has a team of dapple grey mares, full sisters, five and six years old respectively. They will weigh about 1200 each. They were purchased at Jefferson. Mr. Anderson will not part with this beautiful team, but will keep them to use on his lease and funeral work.

A. L. Fisher, who has been in Portland several weeks receiving special treatment, will return home this evening and will rest up here before resuming work at the store.
