HYGIENE ESSAY CONTEST OPEN TO SCHOOL CHILDREN

Prizes From \$5 to \$50 to Be Awarded to Grade and High School Students.

For the purpose of increasing interest in hygiene and giving drill in composition, an essay contest has been arranged.

As the state school law requires that hygiene, with special reference to the effects of stimulants and narcotics, must be taught in all schools, the contest is open to children of all grades.

The children in grades below the seventh may write upon any hygienic subject. The essay in these grades should be short and show definite and practical knowledge. The prize is \$5.

In the seventh and eighth grades and the high school the essays may be written upon any topic bearing upon the effects of stimulants or narcotics upon the body, the mind or upon the efficiency of the individual, and his relation to society.

These essays should be based upon scientific facts and show originality and study. The maximum number of words is 1500.

The state grade prize is \$10 and the National \$25.

The state high school prize is \$15 and the National \$50.

Some of these essays may be read in school or at a parents meeting and the best essay in each of the three grades of contests sent to Mrs. G. L. Buland, 606 Maple St., Portland, Oregon, by May 1st.

If you desire reference material on these subjects you can get it from the State Library, Salem, Oregon. They are sending out, upon application, loan libraries to assist the schools in this essay contest.

Business of Hotel Albany Is Satisfactory For Year; Officers Re-elected.

Fifteen or 16 of the 21 stockholders of the Hotel Albany met last night in the hotel building in their annual meeting. Bert R. Westbrook, manager of the hotel, provided a delicious banquet, and the members sat around the table and discussed the business before them.

J. B. Thompson, R. D. Snell, C. H. Burgraf, W. A. Eastburn and C. C. Cameron were re-elected directors, and it is very likely that at the directors' meeting, which will be held this evening, that the same officers will hold over another year. The officers are: President, C. H. Burgraf, vice-president, C. C. Cameron; Treasurer, E. D. Cusick, and Secretary, J. J. Collins.

The condition of the hotel was found to be in very excellent shape. A resolution was adopted expressing confidence in Manager Bert Westbrook, and the secretary was ordered to write him a letter congratulating him upon conducting the hotel in such an able and satisfactory manner.

The capital stock of the hotel is \$70,000, divided into shares of \$100 each. Manager Westbrook rents the building outright. The stockholders will make a few improvements, such as tinting the walls, completing the cement floor in the kitchen and other minor repairs. The building is in fine shape. Last year the sixth story was finished and fitted up.
