SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

Again a big cloud hovers over the country, and the United States has another problem of great concern to settle. It is in the midst of a stream filled with rocks. Great will be the skill of the pilots if the rocks can be avoided without involving this country in the terrible struggle of Europe. Just now it looks impossible to avoid a break between the United States and Germany, at least so far as diplomatic relations are concerned.

In some respects it might be a good thing for the neutrals to get into the maelstrom and hasten the end of the strife. Should the United States be involved, though it is not probable that this country would do much more than watch her interests on the sea not sending many soldiers actively into the contest, but looking out for commerce on the ocean—relaps taking such a position as Japan has taken.

Other neutrals will also be involved in the same way, in fact some of them have already been given cause to break, but, being small nations, have been slow to resent the insults of the Tentons.

Germany cannot be blamed for using every means possible to win; that's war; but she has no right to interfere with the business of neutrals, where they are minding their business and not participating in the war.

This week has seen the U. S. soldiers, who went down into Mexico to whip the life out of Villa and the Villistas, retiring from the country, without having accomplished that object. Some, with peanuts in their heads, will declare that the campaign has been a failure. As a matter of fact it has been a great success so far as Mexican progress is concerned. Every where except in one section Mexico has taken on new commercial life and the development has been marked. The country is in a better condition than it has ever been before. New enterprises are springing up and everything points to more stable government. The problem now is the muzzling of Villa, which will be up to Carranza and his government, and they will probably be able to solve it. A wonderfully rich country the future of Mexico promises to be a golden one. It has had much to contend with, but will win out, and it will be learned in future years that this expedition has had much to do with the result.

This week the legislature passed a bone-dry bill, for the enforcement of the will of the people as expressed at the election on Nov. 7. There is now considerable liquor in the state, which will take some time to drink; but gradually the effects of the new condition will be seen and materially felt. Mr. Boone in on the run for the woods, an immense enemy of the home, business and nation.

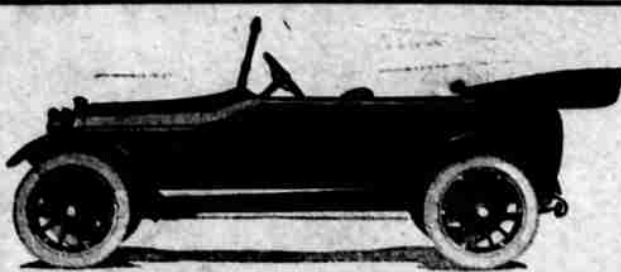
