Again the Hippodrome Vaudeville circuit will entertain Albany theatre patrons tomorrow evening. This time the bill contains a gracious sprinkling of comedy, acrobatic stunts and the more serious presentation of higher class music.

The Remi Duo, a beautifully blended combination of tenor and soprano voices, sing a number of Italian and French duets in a charming manner that appeals to all music lovers. Their stage presence is good and they render their selections in a fascinating way.

Next comes the Wheelers, a lightning fast acrobatic act. Mr. and Mrs. Wheeler do a novelty gymnastic performance that is pleasing to the eyes. Unlike many similar acts, they do not stall, but work fast and put their act "across" in professional style. They are trim figured and well costumed.

Closing this entertaining performance will be Fiore and Lamont, two young men who do a clever comedy act full of rapidfire jokes, original parodies, funny situations and ballad singing. This is one of the best acts of its kind played on this circuit. Both boys have worked with George Beban, the world's greatest character impersonator, and they are said to compare very favorably with the wonderful Italian delineator.

The picture bill is also one of the best yet presented this year and includes Mae Murray in the Paramount drama of New York life, "The Big Sister." There will also be comedy and a news weekly.

O. A. C. GLEE CLUB MADE HIT AT THE GLOBE

A Program Full of College Pep Was Generally Appreciated.

Presenting much the best entertainment ever given by an O. A. C. Glee Club, last night, at the Globe, before a large audience, the 1917 Glee Club of that popular college was given an enthusiastic reception, leaving no doubt of the appreciation of the program.

The Glee Club numbers showed the excellent training under Prof. Gaskins, an aggregation of good voices working together.

The club has a specially good quartet, Messrs. McCollum, Orr, Tulley and Manning, whose offerings were warmly greeted with encores. Tulley's solos were also excellent and McCollum was heard in a neat stunt.

Maris in his vocal solo, "What an Irishman Means by Machee," was given a live return call. He has a very pleasing voice.

McMinn was heard in a humorous reading, "Nothing to Wear." He is a fine looking fellow with a good deal of length; but his enunciation is poor.

The closing part brought out the college pep and added snap to the program.

Jewell and Gow Ding are among the best Celestial performers seen in Oregon college entertainments, perhaps the hit of the program, doing some acting as well as good singing, entering into the spirit of the affair with zest. They appeared in rich Celestial costumes in this specialty, a contrast to their full dress appearance.

Seggel and Swan in their Squirrel Food stunt present a curious makeup with some cute specialties.

A solo by Orr, "Put on Your Slippers and Fill Up Your Pipe," was fair.

Even the Celestials did not make a bigger hit than Olsen, Brandes and Boldenweek in their trio work, "The Harmony Three," and they received more encores than they could answer, which they deserved.

The favorable remarks heard in the corridor spoke for the success of the entertainment and its universal appreciation.
