WORTH WHILE

"BUFFALO BILL" PRAISED BY AN OLD FRIEND

"No man ever worked for a kinder or a more considerate boss than Buffalo Bill and I am sure all the cowboys of the West will unite in erecting a suitable monument to the good friend and scout who has crossed the Great Divide.

This is the statement of Bert Gudgeon, a real, old-fashioned westerner, one of Col. Cody's closest friends. Gudgeon is now doing some of the "rough stuff" for the Fox Film company which is working under the direction of William Nigh, near Chattanooga, Tenn.

Gudgeon was with Buffalo Bill's wild west show in 1905 and 1906, as a leading rough rider, and his daredevil spirit went far toward winning an intimate acquaintance with the Colonel.

"It was with this show that old Hightower, the famous bucking horse made his reputation," says Gudgeon. "He was sure some buckers," he continued. "He was just naturally untamable. There never has been and never will be a more untractable brute.

"Buffalo Bill used to offer from \$25 to \$100 to any outsider who could remain on his back for any length of time. During his career, it never cost the Colonel a penny, either.

"Hightower was unridable for the tenderfoot. He was harder to catch than the Twentieth Century going at full speed. The animal was sold finally to the 101 Ranch Shows, and is owned now by Ringling Brothers, I believe.

"He must be about 16 years old. I saw the old horse four years ago and he was just as wild then as he was as a colt on the Western plains."

The Fox player was born and reared on a ranch and has always lived a strenuous life.

Gudgeon holds the championship belt for roping, which he won after a hard contest in the stampede at Sheephead Bay a few months ago. "There was some good riding on that occasion," Gudgeon declares, "but I told the boys that they would have had to do some sure enough riding had old Hightower been entered in the contest."

In the photoplay which Mr. Nigh is making, Gudgeon has the role of a deputy sheriff who has rather an uncomfortable time of it. One of his pleasant experiences in the picture consists in being roped; then dragged over rock piles and through a creek.

THEDA BARA FINDS WALKS IN MORNING HELP AOTING

According to tradition, the main value of daylight to actors is for sleeping purposes. Theda Bara defies tradition.

The famous William Fox actress, who will soon be seen in "The Vixen," often rises early in the morning, and takes walks along the Hudson River to get the fresh air and sunshine which are of so much help in her art. "The time before most other persons have breakfast," says Miss Bara, "is the best part of the day. One feels invigorated and refreshed by the sweetness of the air, and there are no jostling crowds along the streets to interfere with one's freedom.

"Morning is the only time of the day that I could dare to walk in the open. At other times I have to close myself securely in my limousine, and turn my back towards the crowds, or I should be worried by people staring into the car. I couldn't think of walking at any other hour.

"Morning is also the most interesting part of the day. It is then that one can see the real workers of the city. Occasionally some poor wreck of the night before drifts by on his way home. But most persons seem happy and contented, so that the whole atmosphere is filled with freshness and peace.

"I find that short walks in the morning prepare me better for my work during the day. I can think more clearly and infuse more spirit into my art. My advice to those who want to rise to places of prominence in the photoplay world is this:

"Take plenty of morning air, and you'll work better."

ALL OVER WORLD

High Cost of Living Takes Up Residence in Japan.

Tokio, Jan. 7.—(by mail)—(U. P.)—That modern terror, the High Cost of Living, has today invaded Japan, a country long famed for feeding and clothing its people on a mere pittance. It is estimated in economic circles here that prices of all kinds of goods have increased on an average of 30 per cent.

Staple commodities are included in the general boosting of prices. Sugar has increased from 20 to 30 per cent; salmon, 50 to 100 per cent; wine, 20 per cent; beans, 30 to 40 per cent; grain and canned goods, 10 to 20 per cent; and fuel, 20 per cent. The cost of wearing apparel has also gone up. Also rice.

The war is made to indirectly shoulder the blame for Japan's unusual economic situation.

"But conditions differ according to the commercial status of each nation," says the Hochi Shimbun in commenting on the H. C. of L's conquest of Nippon. Among the causes that underlie the rise in Japan's market prices, are the increased cost of war materials, the prosperity of foreign trade, and the abundance of money. The redundancy of gold and the expansion of convertible notes must also be said to have a significant influence.
