We need a swimming pool. We will have it as soon as you men want it had. It would be a strong attraction. It can be put in for from \$1500 to \$2000. Shall we go after it?

I want to speak in appreciation of General Secretary McDonald. His hours are longer, his activities more varied, and his responsibilities are heavier than those of most of us. He has discharged his duties most faithfully and cheerfully. At every turn he has done more than his duty, and we want him to know that we appreciate his unselfish service.

As you are well aware we have the financial problem always with us, but we are glad to announce that the subscription list this year totals nearly \$2,000, and includes more subscribers than ever before. Mr. Schmitt's offer of the heating plant was first made upon condition that the Association raise \$2500 during the coming year, but later he generously reduced his condition to \$2,000.00, and this has not quite been raised. If any man here has not yet subscribed or wants to raise his subscription, the Secretary is ready to make a note of it.

We can continue upon the present basis with our present equipment, and our present support, but we ought to do better. Plans should be devised for increasing our membership and decreasing our indebtedness. There is room for improvement along every line. Let us thank God for the opportunity he has given us, and for the responsibility he has laid upon us, and begin the new year with renewed zeal and courage.

When the gift of the heating plant by A. C. Schmitt was mentioned, someone cried, "What's the matter with Schmitt?" and all responded, "He's all right," followed by three cheers, and Prof. McDonald, the popular secretary, received a like ovation upon the mention of his name.

Announcement was made that there will be a regular Monday evening Bible study, under Rev. Young, Monday evenings from 6:45 to 7:30, and also that Raymond Robbins, a Y. M. C. A. worker of national fame, will be here Friday, Feb. 16 and give an address.

Prof. McDonald made a good report of the work of the Association, partly duplicated by other reports. He spoke for the interest in the work, with plenty of room for more in the gym classes. During the year there were from 22,000 to 25,000 visitors at the rooms; 6895 baths were taken, an average of 21 1-3 a day. The boy scouts are well organized with a membership of 32, and have specially enjoyed their Cascade camping experiences. His presentation of the father's debt to his son was a good one.

Three cheers, by his suggestion, were given to the ladies who helped in the banquet.
