SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS

Standing out first in the eyes of the world this week has been the break between the United States and Germany. In connection with it of special interest was the action of the U. S. Senate in endorsing the action of the president, regardless of politics, by nearly a unanimous vote, only five being against, one of those being an Oregon senator who is absolutely opposed to war. Senator Works, of California, who has very properly been retired from the Senate and will quit March 4, took a prominent part in the opposition, using strong and uncalled for language. So far as public office is concerned his name will be changed to Rest. All kinds of a politician, he flopped and floundered around like an eel in a frying pan, scorching himself beyond redemption.

The masses are solidly back of the President, and appreciate the fact that the course he took was inevitable. Time will undoubtedly demonstrate its wisdom. In the meantime every loyal citizen will stand firmly back of him, with confidence in his judgment as they have been in the past, knowing that he will not take any step hastily, and only until his patience is exhausted. No one wishes war except the extremely selfish; but most people want to see the honor of the country sustained.

But even if war comes it would be a long time before this country actually got into it, then probably only on the sea and in preparation for defense at home. By that time the outlook will be for peace. The general sentiment is that it is bound to come by autumn.

Oregon's legislature is in its last stages this week. It has done a few things in proper shape and attempted numerous things that were execrable. The dry-bone law is an effective one. If there are any holes in it they have not been discovered yet. Another striking law, on the way thru, is the anti-cigarette law. Cigarette smoking by boys especially has become such an injurious matter as to demand prompt action. Many cigarette dealers have done the same as liquor dealers have done, paid no attention to the law, and sold to boys regardless of age. If the law had been observed it is doubtful if this action would have been taken at this time. The boys must be protected. If a man long in years who has seen the evil of the thing wants to continue the suicidal course of cigarette smoking it is his own outlook to a certain extent.

That is a pretty good motto of the Boy Scouts, to help others. Too many children are brought up in selfishness, which becomes imbedded in their natures so strongly as to warp their lives. If they were taught more to look out for others, and to think of others first, it would transform their lives, making them big instead of small. Whatever takes selfishness, one of man's greatest enemies, out of mankind, deserves a hard pat on the back.

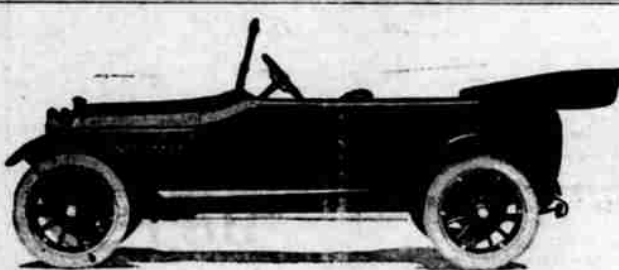
