PROMINENT PIONEER WOMAN VISITING AT JUDGE HEWITT'S

Mrs. John Kirkwood, of Hopewell, cowboy competes, is at work in one visit at the home of her nephew, Judge H. H. Hewitt. Mrs. Kirkwood was the youngest sister of the mother of Judge Hewitt, and the only surviving member of the family. She was a daughter of Capt. Mathany, a prominent Oregon pioneer, and came across the plains with him and the rest of the family in 1843. She is now 79 years of age, in good health, and enjoys telling of the experiences of her 73 years in Oregon. Among her children is Mrs. C. C. Chapman, of Portland, wife of the editor of the Voter, former manager of the Portland Commercial club.

ANDERSONS ON WAY BACK TO ALASKA

Mr. and Mrs. Carl N. Anderson, who have been visiting with Mrs. Anderson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Grant Pirtle, left this afternoon for Portland on their way back to Alaska. They will visit Mr. Anderson's parents in Portland for a day and then proceed to Seattle where Mr. Anderson will buy supplies to take back to the mines with them. They expect to sail north in about a week. It had not been their intention to leave before March, but a telegram from the north last week hurried their plans. It is necessary for them to go in before spring starts, for with 300 to 400 tons of goods to freight in, advantage must be taken of the ice. They go to Anchorage, the terminus of the railroad, and then go up Copper River to the end of the road, and pack about 20 miles overland. Part of the way is over a glacier.

IT'S RAVAGES

Statistics compiled by Philadelphia authorities prove that 78 out of the 84 murders investigated by the city during 1916 were due directly or indirectly to rum. The police made 35,258 arrests for intoxication in 11 months, averaging about 3,200 a month. During the year 1,982 persons were committed to the House of Correction as vagrants, the majority of whom became delinquents through drink. Sixteen hundred were committed on straight charges of drunkenness. The warden supplements his testimony, that 75 per cent of the prisoners in that institution are there because of rum, by the following explanation:

"I made this estimate on the authority of the men themselves. Furthermore, all the broken paroles from this institution are due to drink."

COUGAR KILLED NEAR CASCADIA IS LARGE

According to oldtimers, the cougar which L. E. Buchanan, of Cascadia, brought to the county clerk's office today to claim a reward for bounty, is the largest killed in those parts in many months. The huge, cat-like beast measures nine feet ten inches from tip to tip. Mr. Buchanan, a rancher, killed it last December. John Short, considered a authority in the Cascadia district and who has the record of bringing more pelts to the clerk's office for bounties than any other man, says it is the biggest of the year and the best specimen he has seen for some time.

This big cat will net Mr. Buchanan \$25. He received \$10 from the county and a warrant on the state treasurer for \$15 more. He also received \$6 for three bobcat scalps which he killed in December, collecting in all \$31.
