SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS

Closer and closer comes the god of war with his enormous juggernaut, and it cannot be figured how the U. S. can keep out of his grasp with honor. President Wilson has followed the waiting plan to the limit. He has displayed a patience that has excited both admiration and criticism. The climax is being reached.

The submarine blockade system involving the rights of neutrals has become intolerable. Little Holland is probably suffering most, but must bear the stigma, because weak, and in no condition to face the C. man guns. But the United States is recognized as a world power, if not the greatest, and must as a nation show its colors.

Nevertheless, there should be no declaration until all resources have been exhausted.

The war itself continues, but the submarine question has so much overshadowed other questions as to make the slaughter a side issue temporarily. It is nevertheless going on in the same old dugouts, down in the mud and slime, with a low tempera-

ture, giving the soldiers an experience of disease as well as bullets.

In this country, taking advantage of the situation some very ornery Mexicans have again been causing trouble along the border, a few getting across the line and killing three cowboys. If Carranza was attending to business according to program this would be impossible; but he is safely housed in Mexico City, and is paying little attention to his promises.

Congress this week has taken strong steps leading up to national prohibition, of a character to indicate that it is inevitable within a few years. 1920 will at least see the last of the saloon in the U. S. as an institution, driven back into the hole of the blind pig, tiger, or whatever it may be called. It is coming just as sure as night follows day, regardless of the revenue question, rising above money consideration. The greatest enemy of the home, the whole country is up in arms against it.

The state legislature adjourns this evening after a 41-days' session, one day being thrown in for good or poor measure. One paper says it is 75 per cent bad. Another one declares it has done good work. In viewing the result one should rise above politics, not an easy thing to do when the members run politics into almost everything. All thru it selfishness has seemed to dominate affairs, with an occasional glimmer of sunshine thru the clouds. It is possible that altogether the record will not be a bad one, several good measures having been enacted into law of a beneficial character. Responsible for much is the six per cent limitation law enacted by the people, which the members have done well to respect.
