ANNETTE KELLERMAN WONDER PICTURE BOOKED FOR GLOBE

After months of waiting for what is considered as one of the greatest photoplays of the age, Albany people at last have a definite date set for viewing the magnificent William Fox spectacle, "The Daughter of the Gods." Manager C. A. Meyer, of the Globe theatre yesterday notified that Albany will view this picture March 14 and 15.

REPLY IS FILED IN FORECLOSURE SUIT

Plaintiffs in the case of M. M. Myers vs George E. Schuyman have filed a reply to answer of defendants. The suit was filed Jan. 4, to foreclose a note for \$1200 given in payment for 20 acres of land. Only \$1200 on account of labor had been credited.

In the reply filed today plaintiffs admit that they took their horses from Schuyman and that there was work to be done both on the 20 acres and the 60 acres of Myers adjoining, but that defendant beat and abused the horses and did not properly care for them and that he feared they would be made valueless.

NEW WHACKING

U. S. Senator Denounces Liquor Men For Playing On Good Name "United Press."

Washington, Feb. 19.—Senator Sheppard denounced in the United States Senate an outfit in Cleveland, Ohio, which is sending out statements favoring the liquor interests and attempting to create the impression that they are from the United Press Association of New York.

Senator Sheppard exposed "this endeavor of the liquor interests to perpetuate their existence in this country." The Senator's statement is included in the following excerpt from the Congressional Record of Feb. 3, 1917, page 2823:

"Mr. SHEPPARD. Mr. President, I wish to direct the attention of the Senate to the fact that a concern calling itself the United Press Association has been sending out over the country free newspaper copy favoring the liquor interests. This copy is sent out under an envelope bearing the return address, 'The United Press Association, Cleveland.' The impression has thus been created that the famous association, familiarly known as the 'United Press' is sending out this copy. The United Press has taken notice of the fact and has issued a statement which I ask to have the Secretary read. The proper name of the United Press is 'United Press Association,' and the head office of this great organization is located in the city of New York.
