It is honorable in the individual to render the largest service possible—it is honorable for him to do this no matter what criticism he has to face. The highest honor is to be won by doing the most good. The same rule applies to nations—if not, what rule does apply? It will be honorable, therefore, for our nation to postpone, if necessary until after the war the settlement of any disputes that can not be now settled by peaceful means, if by postponement we can render the world a larger service.

Is it not honorable to save our own people from the calamities that have overtaken the belligerent nations, and at the same time be in a position to play a friend's part in the promotion of peace in Europe? Is it not honorable, also, to consult, by means of a referendum the people who must go to war, before calling them up to the battle line?

Now is the time to scrutinize the various standards of honor proposed and select the highest the best and the noblest.
