Instead there is everything to indicate a very reasonable attitude on public questions, and certainly a friendly relationship towards the U. S. The policy of the U. It should be big in its dealings with the world.

But may it not happen. May this nation be as patient as it is possible to be, with honor. May it realize the awful anger of the combatants, and appreciate the fearful tension of the situation. It is not easy to deal with an angry person, why any more so with a nation mad to the center.

Food riots are attracting attention. The infamous cost of many articles of food is enough to make the sphynx turn towards the west. Most of it is the result of greed. We have laws against trusts, but the trusts are to blame for much of this. Take sugar. The raising of the price beyond 10c is merely robbery. It is done to rob the masses and it does it. The trust gets the money. The local dealer doesn't make enough on sugar to support a Chinaman five minutes.

Snow is as much out of place in the Willamette valley as it would be in cauldron. It always grates on one's nerves. It is less welcome than a poor relative or a hobo on a busy morning. It doesn't fit into things here, with our moderate temperature, made so by the current all the way from Japan.
