THE MENACE OF WAR

To the Editor—

The world has for several decades been face to face with the menace of war. The leading statesmen and diplomats have been aware, to some extent at least, of the tenseness of the conditions that were prevalent in the world. When, in August 1914, the present cataclysm burst upon many as a thunder bolt out of a clear sky, to those who were familiar with world affairs it was a matter of no great surprise, altho the gigantic proportion which it speedily assumed, was far beyond the expectations of the most radical observers.

Though at times America was about to be drawn into serious complications, yet till quite recently we were able to maintain our neutral position. Today our nation stands upon the threshold of war, and as at no previous time we begin to hasten ourselves and venture opinions as to what the outcome will be. And when we take into consideration the efforts that have been made to avert these conditions and we see the failures that have so far met these efforts, the future looks dark indeed to anyone, who has had faith in the ability of man to bring about peaceable solutions of these problems. Coming as it did on the very eve of a peace tribunal and in an age when many and large societies had been founded with the object in view of the preservation of peace, this war has caused many to look to other sources than courts of arbitration for some remedy that will bring about reform. In any society or movement which is founded for the purpose of reform, that reform must begin with the individuals or unit of which that society or movement is composed. In other words, if wars are to be averted in the future the reform must begin in the heart and lives of individuals.

"Holy writ" has very clearly pointed out to us the source of all war and disorder, fully and finally. "From whence come wars and fightings among you? come they not hence, even of your lusts (Margin pleasures) that war in your members? Ye lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not. Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your pleasures, (margin) Jas. 4: 1-3.

Some nations lust for and desire some things enough, so that they are willing to spend must blood and money to obtain them. There is where war starts. Now the remedy is this: "who is a wise man and endured with knowledge among you? let him show out of a good conversation his works with meekness of wisdom. For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work. But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle and easy to be entreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without wrangling, (margin) and without hypocrisy. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace." Jas. 3: 13-18.

Jesus Christ said when upon this earth: "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called the children of God."

There may be what are considered righteous wars or wars of self defense, but always there is the aggressor or else there would be no need of self defense.

There is only one way of destroying the menace of war and that is the way pointed out by the scripture. We must accept the principles of righteousness that are revealed in God's Word. The world at large refuses to do this, so every other plan is but subterfuge and is doomed to failure. Lasting peace will never be established on this earth until the "Prince of Peace" is enshrined in the hearts of men. We will look in vain to peace societies and courts of arbitration for a remedy of present conditions. Mankind as a remdy will pursue their present course until the final clash will be precipitated at the battle of Armageddon, and then the end will come.
