WHAT WILL BE PLANTED ON THE P.O. GROUNDS

The post office grounds will be im-
proved in the manner outlined below,
as stated on the plans furnished by
H. E. Brendette, a Portland landscape
architect. The contract for the
shrubs and work was let to the Alb-
any Nurseries Co. for \$261. The work
will begin at once and will be finish-
ed by June 1.

The trees and shrubs amount in num-
ber to 142, and will be planted ac-
cording to the following scheme: At
the south west corner of the building
and on the small piece of lawn im-
mediately south there will be several
clumps of cotoneasters. At each side
of the west entrance to the building
Deutzias. At each side of the north
entrance, Spiraea, at the north east
and north-west corners of the build-
ing, Japanese Barberry. Beginning
at the driveway and running east
along the line of the alley there will
be Strawberry Trees, arbutus, Law-
son Cypress and English Holly. Be-
ginning at the front on Second St.,
and running south along the east line
will be Weigela, Snowballs, Tamar-
isks, Lawson Cypress and English
Holly. The other varieties men-
tioned in the list be placed wherever

it is thought they will show to the
best advantage. They are:

4 purple leafed barberry, 12 Japa-
nese barberry, 7 Lawson cypress, 18
Cotoneaster, 8 Japanese cedar, 6 slender
deutzia, 6 Deutzia—pride of Ro-
chester, 4 Weigela—Eva Rathke, 6
Euonymus, 3 Golden Bell, 12 Eng-
lish holly, 2 Japanese brush hone-
ysuckle, 8 Oregon grape, 4 Japanese
Yew, 13 Spiraea—Anthony Waterer,
13 Spiraea—Van Houtte, 3 African
Tamarisk, 4 Snowball, 6 Laurustinus,
1 Sweet Gum Tree, 1 Sugar Maple,
1 sycamore.

With English in the
Lead.

Over in the Hotel Catlin, last night
there were fourteen boarders, men
from all parts of the world, and all
of them north bound except a Mex-
ican, who came from Portland this
way. Their nationalities were well
mixed up, the Allies well in the lead.
In fact there were five English, two
Irish and three Americans and one
Greek, who could be depended upon
as allies in case of trouble, with only
two Germans, who are probably loyal
to this country, and one Mexican.
Among them were fellows who have
seen "better days." That was plain
from their appearance.
