Value of Cow Testing Aply Demonstrated

Shedd Man, Who Has Been Carrying on Testing Alone for Some Time, Scores Highest in Field of 14 Cows First Month of Work

The fact that half of the cows of the Linn County Cow Testing Assn. producing over 45 pounds of butterfat in 30 days are in the herd which has been carrying on testing and the keeping of individual production records the longest, furnishes a striking example of the value of such work.

The first month's work of the cow-testing association gives an honor roll of 14 cows which have produced

over 45 pounds of butterfat. Five of these are Jersey Grades and nine are registered Pure-bred Jerseys. Seven of these high producers are in the herd of J. M. Dickson & Son at Shedd, who have been carrying on the testing work themselves longer than any one else in the association.
