WHITE SOUNDS KEYNOTE AT DEMOCRATIC BANQUET

Chairman of State Committee
Urges Non-partisan Support of President.

Mr. Toastmaster, Ladies and Gentlemen: Prior to and at the time of the last election, some of us were Democrats and some of us Republicans. I am inclined to think, however, it was a kind providence that caused the most of us to be Wilson men and women on November 7th last. Be that as it may, today we are neither democrats or republicans, but all of us are Americans. In this, the hour of our need, party differences are forgotten and every true heart within this land beats with but a single impulse of love for the flag of our fathers and loyalty to our President, upon whom rests the momentous duty and responsibility of guiding the destinies of this nation through these times fraught with unseen dangers on every hand.

We all believe in the justice, wisdom and moderation of President

Wilson and with one accord we will follow where he leads and no matter what comes as a result of the insanity of the Old World, our President will have the loyal support of the people everywhere in this enlightened and Christian land, and in no portion of it will he be supported more loyally than by the progressive and forward-thinking men and women of the State of Oregon.

True, Oregon is very removed from the seat of Government and is little known to the millions east of the Mississippi river and her electoral vote is small and relatively insignificant, yet way out here beyond the Rockies where rolls the Oregon, we grow men and women of full intellectual and moral stature whose eyes are turned toward the future, whose minds and hearts are filled with American ideals and American standards of what is right, just and humane between nations, as well as between individuals; American standards and ideals of Christianity and the duties and responsibilities of man to man nation to nation.

In all civilized countries the taking of human life, except in self-defense or in defense of one's home or family, is accounted a crime against the laws of both God and man and punished as such. Yet, the most civilized nations of the earth still cut each others throats because of honor wounded or on account of commercial advantage, territorial acquisition and national jealousies and hatreds.

Man, as an individual, within the last hundred years, has become human, civilized and Christianized while men aggregations—as national units, is still barbarous, uncivilized and unchristian. I take it as a fundamental and eternal Christian truth that the intentional taking of a human life, either by an individual or a nation, is nothing less than murder; except when done in self-defense or in defense of home and family. However, a brighter day is dawning, hastening and made more certain by this awful cataclysm beyond the seas.

I do not believe it is a dream of a visionary when I say it is only a matter of time, and a short time at that,

when national duels will be as abhorrent to all good men in every land as the individual duel is now in this country, and when a nation that engages in any other than a war of self-defense, will be classed as an outlaw among nations and punished by the civilized world as such. Throughout the world, civilization among the masses has been moving onward and upward with mighty strides in spite of the present European lapse and the rights, duties and responsibilities of man to man nation to nation, are becoming more and more recognized and respected by the people everywhere, if not by rulers of nations.

To me, the future is full of rich promise, and awful as is the present war, it is teaching many useful and serviceable lessons, not only to the participants in this death struggle, but to all the world, the beneficial results of which will undoubtedly prove a humanizing and Christianizing influence and will be the means of eradicating from the minds of man, and even of nations, many ancient governmental heresies which in the past have retarded human progress and marred and wrecked the lives and happiness of millions of men and women. The present war is fast hastening the dawning of a more perfect day when the flower of democracy shall bloom

throughout the earth in every land, exhaling the sweet perfume of human rights and human liberties—the dawning of the day when the mighty tree of the people's rule shall flourish and extend its protecting branches over the earth, bringing peace on earth and good-will among God's children everywhere.

It takes no prophetic sight to vision as the result of this war the tottering of thrones, the overthrow of Kings and the downfall of monarchy and the rise of democracy phoenix-like from the ashes of arbitrary and tyrannical power.

The new and modern governmental doctrine of the divine rights of the people to rule and govern themselves is fast supplanting in every land the ancient heresy of the divine right of kings, for the masses everywhere are beginning to realize as never before the solemn and fundamental truth of the declaration of the immortal Jefferson, made at the birth of this nation, that "All governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed." After more than one hundred years the world is beginning to see the beacon light of American liberty erected by the founders of this government for the guidance and enlightenment of mankind.

This nation is destined by reason of its greatness, its geographical isolation, its superior civilization, its higher Christianity and its commercial dominance to be a leader in the great work of extending throughout the world the people's rule, the wise and human principles of democracy.

This nation is destined to impress upon all the nations of the earth American governmental ideas and standards of liberty, justice, truth and humanity under the guiding hand of that wise and just statesman, Woodrow Wilson, above and about whom there hovers during these critical times the spirits of the immortal Washington and the martyred Lincoln, whispering wisdom into his ear and pouring into his heart patriotic love of country and tender solicitude for the miseries of mankind. PORTLAND PAPER ADVISES FARMERS TO STUDY MARKETS

The following editorial from the Portland Live Stock reporter sounds some good advice on markets. Many farmers do not keep in close touch with the prevailing prices, nor do they pay enough attention to the right time to sell.

"We often hear the remark: 'What good are these high prices for cattle, hogs and sheep to the farmer who has no cattle, hogs or sheep to sell?' Some stockmen seem to be unfortunate in always getting in at the wrong time, while there are others who appear to have a faculty for always getting in on the high markets. It is not a matter of chance altogether. It is to a great extent a matter of watching the markets and taking advantage of conditions. The farmer who has learned to study the market conditions is the man who has learned his business and is also the one who is reaping the profits of his stock today."
